Giving God His Money Back



Bill Gates, the founder of Microsoft, is a very rich man with a personal fortune estimated at \$65 billion. This fortune was built up with hard work and dedication to the Microsoft firm he founded, pushing it forward with a passion. Now retired from the firm he has a new passion, to give his money away doing God's work in the world.

Bill has set his target on eradicating polio, which still blights many lives in the world today, and yet is preventa-

ble. Later this month, Bill Gates will deliver the BBC's Dimbleby Lecture, taking as his theme the value of the young human being. Every child, he will say, has the right to a healthy and productive life, and he will explain how technology and innovation can help towards the attainment of that still-distant goal. He has put his money where his mouth is, for he and his wife Melinda have so far given away \$28 billion via their charitable foundation, more than \$8 billion of it to improve global health.

Bill Gates has learnt the important lesson that great wealth brings with it great responsibilities. If we just sit amongst it and enjoy it without helping others, then we will have failed in our humanity, just as the rich man in Luke 16: 9 - 31 failed the beggar Lazarus - not by actively hurting him, but by failing to do anything to help him.

We are called to do our bit too, in showing generosity in supporting God's work in the world, for despite the recession, we are still in the richest 5% of the world's population.

Our Archbishop is calling all of the Churches in the Diocese to look at their generosity as we seek to nurture and grow disciples. A strong Church can do so much good in the world around us, but a weak Church far less. So from next year onwards we are being asked to volunteer what we shall give as Parishes towards the Diocesan budget, trusting in our generosity. This is a great risk, for the money given pays for the clergy in the Parishes, so less money means less clergy. Experience would suggest that when you take the clergy out of Parishes, attendances can fall and income reduces accordingly. Will it work? Our Archbishop is a great man of faith and always sees the glass half full rather than half empty. He knows that despite the recession that we still have so much to be thankful for. He also realises that there is an anxiety out there that is causing some Churches to hold back on generosity, keeping money in reserve in case of a rainy day. Anxiety is never fertile ground for anything positive to grow, so he is seeking to transform our outlook into a more positive, faithful and joyful one by encouraging us to look at five signs of a healthy Church: Christlikeness, Commitment, Partnership, Influence and Numbers. By looking to these things we will then hopefully begin to look more positively around us.

I know that I am very privileged to be Vicar of two Parishes that constantly show their generosity in reaching out to others in need by supporting many good causes and charities throughout the year, as well as the work that goes on locally. There is often mention of this in Spire, and our Christmas Appeal features this month.

Our generosity is nothing compared to God's generosity to us. We do receive so much in so many ways, and in comparison even our giving could be more than it is.

So as we move through 2013 I am asking all Church members and all who care about our Church, to be generous and committed in your support, be it through the time you give, the talents you employ for the Church's good, and in the generous financial support that you offer to Church, that our witness may grow and move forward and that we may help do more good in the world by giving back to God something of what He has given to us.

The inspection looks at the following areas:

- How well does the school, through its distinctive Christian character, meet the needs of all learners?
- What is the impact of collective worship on the school community?
- How effective is the religious education?
- How effective are the leadership and management of the school as a church school?

The Inspector visits the school, talks to children, teachers, parents, the Governors and Headteacher to ensure all is going well.

Last term Marwood School has its Church Inspection (called a SIAS Inspection - Statutory Inspection of Anglican Schools) and the report declared Marwood Church of England Infant School to be Outstanding in all areas. We send our congratulations to Mrs Wilson and all the school community for this marvellous result.

WHY MUSLIMS PERSECUTE CHRISTIANS AND WHY THE WEST IGNORES IT

A new report has exposed the West's blindness to the persecution of Christians around the world; it highlights how the "lion's share" of this is done by Muslims, whom the media do not want to criticise over misplaced fears of "racism".

Christianophobia, which was published last month, written by journalist Rupert Shortt for Civitas, argues that "Christians are targeted more than any other body of believers." He quotes research by the Pew Forum and the World Evangelical Alliance, which estimates that 200 million Christians (ten per cent of the global total) are socially disadvantaged, harassed or actively oppressed for their faith.

Focusing on the plight of Christians in seven countries (Egypt, Iraq, Pakistan, Nigeria, India, Burma and China), Shortt catalogues some of the most egregious

attacks on Christians in recent years.

He states:

In the large area between Morocco and Pakistan ... there is scarcely a country in which church life operates without restrictions.

Syria, he writes, had been "one of the exceptions until now", but the country is currently wracked by civil war, and thousands of Christians have been driven from their homes.

Quoting the estimates of scholars that between half and two-thirds of Christians in the Middle East have left or been killed over the last century, Shortt states, "There is now a serious risk that Christianity will disappear from its Biblical heartlands."

The report argues that the "lion's share" of anti-Christian persecution happens in Muslim-majority societies, where religious freedom is generally very restricted. But it also rightly stresses that much "Christianophobia" has nothing to do with militant Islam. It is rife under the Communist regimes of China and North Korea and also in mainly Buddhist societies such as Sri Lanka and Burma.

Shortt quotes a revealing study, Religious Freedom in the World,by the think-tank Freedom House, which examined the records of many countries. Of the 20

surveyed that were deemed "unfree", Muslim-majority societies comprised 12, while of the 41 judged "free", 35 were traditionally Christian. Buddhist countries with Communist governments (China, Tibet, Laos, North Korea and Vietnam) also scored poorly.

Christianophobia raises the issue of why the persecution of Christians is so little known to Western audiences and says that governments and other influential players have a "blind spot" that causes them "to squander a broader opportunity", adding, "Religious freedom is the canary in the mine for human rights generally."

Shortt suggests that the subject does not receive much attention for two reasons: first, because "persecuted Christians tend not to respond with terrorist violence", and second, because "parts of the media have been influenced by the logical error that equates criticism of Muslims with racism, and therefore as wrong by definition".

The violence against Christians in Muslim-majority contexts cannot be blamed solely on Islam itself. Western governments, especially the US and British, need to be held to account for the way that their foreign policies, particularly in the Middle East, have increased the danger for Christian minorities.

They do not appear to be learning from history either, as they are now backing the opposition to President Bashar al-Assad in Syria. Like Saddam Hussein in Iraq, Assad had afforded the Christian community in Syria a considerable degree of protection and freedom; this has now been shattered by war and seems unlikely to be restored by any new regime, as Islamists have gained influence in the effort to oust the president.

Western support for the Arab Spring, which has promoted the rise of political Islam, has ignored the implications for Christians in the Middle East and North Africa. In Egypt, where the Muslim Brotherhood is in control, violence against Christians has increased markedly since the revolution.

There are concerns about what is going to happen to the sizeable Christian minorities in Syria and Egypt and whether they will be able to remain in these lands, which have had a significant Christian presence since the dawn of the faith and long before Islam existed.

Will Western governments open their eyes to this crisis, which is partly of their own making, before it is too late?

Charity Auction – Saturday, 2nd February

Our annual Charity Auction this year is to be held on Saturday, 2nd February in the Parochial Hall at 2.00pm, viewing from 1.30. The proceeds of the Auction this year will go to the 'Eating Stones Fund'. Information about the Fund can be obtained from their website at <u>www.eatingstones.co.uk</u>.

The Eating Stones Fund UK was established in April 2007 by an international development student from Leeds University, Chris Ferry, after spending time working with a social development group and HIV/AIDs clinic in an area of slum dwelling on the edge of the Kenyan capital, Nairobi.

The people in Kenya's slums are affected by poverty and sickness every day of their lives. As a result, adults are unable to work, children become malnourished and many are orphaned.

By the summer of 2008 the two groups were struggling to care for 37 orphaned or abandoned children. 30 of them were sleeping in one small tin shack, on 3 urine-soaked mattresses. Many had been left behind when family members died as



a result of HIV/AIDS related complications.

Moved by their plight, Chris

began this new charity which has grown over the years. After months of hard work and with some fantastic support from UK and US donors, they were able to rent a site and transform it into a new home for the children. Alongside the orphanage, the Robert Henry Academy and Clinic were established. Since then our work in Kenya has grown. We now provide a home to 48 children. In order to comply with regulations a new organisation, The Eating Stones Organisation, was created in Kenya to oversee the orphanage, academy and clinic. All the children's needs are catered for at their new home, which is run and managed by volunteers, or staff paid only a token wage. Most of the children are educated on site by two fully qualified teachers and we have been able to open up the academy to 14 children from the surrounding area who otherwise would not have access to an education.

The Eating Stones Fund was given its name in recognition of the daily plight of children in Kenya's slums who resort to eating stones, desperate for any source of nutrients.

Do come along to our Auction and support this worthwhile charity. The grandmother of the student who established the charity lives in Greenacre Close so we do have a local connection.

What Else Did the Vicar Do?

When Ken Taylor, treasurer of Great Ayton parish church, set out to put together a history of the church, he found himself with something of a mystery.

It was well known that the Rev. Joseph Ibbetson, who was vicar of Ayton from 1827 to 1878, had been the driving force behind the construction of Christ Church, which was opened in May 1876.



His almost single-handed efforts to raise the necessary £5000, enticing subscriptions from even the Archbishop of York as well as many other individuals locally and throughout the country, were well documented.

Yet little is known about the vicar's other activities within the community during his remarkable 50-year stint in the village. "He must have made quite an impact, as he was a strong character," said Ken. "But we don't know what he was involved in outside of the parish church. If anyone has any information which would help fill in the blank, I would be very pleased to hear from them, although we appreciate it is looking back well over a century."

Mr Ibbetson is known to have had pretty strict views. One of his first decrees was to ban "ale or liquor" from vestry meetings (It is a surprise to find this was necessary !). He instigated the building of a new vicarage (the present one behind Christ Church); the old one, now Winford House, became a temperance hotel, the "Bob and Tanner."

The new Christ Church, built on land on Guisborough Road given by Captain Marwood, was needed because the congregation, swelled by the development of mining in the area, had outgrown the 12th century All Saints, which is now a tourist attraction because of its Captain Cook connection but still used several times a year.

When he retired, shortly after the completion of the new church, Mr Ibbetson went to live at Darlington. But when he died in 1887 he was buried at Great Ayton, as was his much revered wife, Elizabeth (daughter of Thomas and Ann Simpson of Nunthorpe Hall), whose diligent and caring work among the community earned her the soubriquet, "the Faithful Shepherdess" at her death in 1869.

Ken's Church history is a contribution to the much wider grant aided village history project whoich has been running for several years and has led to the formation of the Great Ayton History Society.
