The Prayer of Presence

Over recent weeks I have heard from several people who have loved ones with terminal conditions. It's so hard to deal with this news, but the added problem for the Christian is what to pray for.

Do we assume life is the only answer, and so always pray for recovery, or should we be praying for strength to cope with the situation knowing that everything and everyone has their time and sometimes no amount of prayer can possibly change that?

I know that when we first came here 20 years ago and our new born son was so desperately ill, that we were supported so much with prayer and feeling this was a tangible experience. Thankfully our son, David, survived and is now 20 and just finishing his first year at University, but he didn't escape disability and the daily challenges that presents each and every day of his life.

I confess that as a priest as I am often at a loss at what to ask for. I have seen people I have prayed to recover die shortly afterwards, and others I have given the Last Rites to, make a recovery and come out of hospital and live several more years.(Remember that lovely chap Bob Farrow?)

Often all we can really do is simply be there and the assurance of our presence says it all.

When I was Vicar of St Martin's I had an older couple from St Francis RC Church lived opposite. I would often pop across for a cuppa and a chat. On the morning of our wedding day the husband died and Karen took her bouquet to his widow before we left for our honeymoon. Martin had been failing for a while, and Agnes had inscribed on his stone these words she had written herself.

Beside his bed to hold his hand, he knew I was there to understand.

Often our quiet presence is the most reassuring and effective prayer of all. Paul

Our Churchwardens



Churchwardens remain as one of the oldest lay offices of the land. Appointed by the Annual Church meeting of the Church, they serve as officers to the Bishop with a responsibility to co-operate with the Incumbent in helping deliver the mission of the Church, as well as being responsible for many legal matters in the Parish and particularly the building.

We have been most fortunate in both Great Ayton and Newton in having really dedicated people stand for the position, and continue for several years apiece helping give stability to our Churches.

There used to be a Vicar's Warden appointed by the Vicar, and a People's Warden elected at the annual meeting - hence the staffs of office usually have a Mitre and Crown respectively. Today both Churchwardens are elected at the Annual Meeting and then have to attend a formal Visitation Service



where they are officially sworn in. This year it took place in York Minster before Archbishop Sentamu.

Following their appointment we also receive them into office in our respective Churches so that the congregations know them and can offer their support and prayers.

Newton News

Anyone visiting the Memorial Garden at St Oswald's Church will have seen the "delicate" state of the churchyard wall. Trees planted too near the wall many years ago, are now pushing it over. The process has been gradual and started many years ago, as witnessed by the concrete buttresses put in many years ago before the land belonged to the Church. Nature usually wins,



and one section is on the verge of collapse, and the other side from the gate is broken and given a few more years will be in a similar state.

The PCC have given thorough consideration to what to do, for to save the wall could mean losing several mature trees - and we have already lost one very large horse chestnut with bleeding canker and are watching the nearby one closely. We don't want to lose more trees, for that will change the leafy setting considerably, as well as affecting the water table in an already wet Churchyard.

The wall used to mark our boundary, but since the Bradleys gave the land to the Church in the 1980s, the boundary is further out.

After consulting with our Architect we have decided to apply for faculty to remove that section of wall and landscape the ground between the Churchyard and garden. This work will take place later in the year, if faculty is granted, but we hope to take down any dangerous sections soon.



In a chance google search to find out what a Papakata was I discovered Angrove Park, Great Ayton. Incredibly I drive passed it most days and had never noticed, but it is a brilliant venue for camping, walking holidays and even weddings, set within Winley Hill Farm on the road to Stokesley.



The centrally heated cabins with raised mattresses and lights give my style of camping. A modern shower and toilet block provide all the necessary facilities, and a communal cooking and eating area under cover provide for those grey days when you can't use your picnic table outside your cabin.



Some fantastic tree trunks provide a wonderful area for children to play with imagination, and a roaring fire with sheltered seats around it, prepare us for the British Summer as we sing our songs on sultry evenings.

Angrove Park is already being used by many walking groups or those wanting a cheaper way of getting folk away together.

I was interested to see that Louise and Alan Petch, who run it, are also hosting weddings with - you've guessed it - Papakatas! A Papakata is a very large tent - more Wigwam than Marquee - and is proving very popular for weddings.


