Help for Syrian Christians

Last month I was proud to be British when our Parliament put the brakes on the bombing of Syria following the use of chemical weapons in their civil war. Whilst some countries suggested we are now of no account and not worthy of attention any more, it is quite clear that our actions did have an effect in stopping an escalation of violence, and hopefully helping pave the way for the eradication of chemical weapons in Syria.

What is happening in that country is very tragic, and it would appear that bad things are happening on both sides. The ancient Christian community of Syria has been caught in the middle of it all. We remember well the visit of Caroline Kerslake from The Barnabas Fund when we were raising money to extend a Church in Aleppo in Millennium year.



She spoke then of the strict regime that Christians lived under, and the fear of the secret police - but at least life could go on.

Many Christians have now fled their homes, for they fear that if the Islamists win, they will no longer be welcome in their own country. Already we have heard reports of Churches being targeted by the rebels and forced conversions to Islam. Sadly this pattern is being repeated in other Middle Eastern countries where "tyrants" have been deposed. In Egypt more Churches were attacked this last year than the previous 20 years put together.

What can we do to help?

- 1. Remember Syria in our prayers, and especially the plight of the Christians. Over 600,000 have been displaced and are now living as refugees in neighbouring countries. Pray that these ancient communities may live in peace and harmony.
- 2. Bring their plight to the attention of world leaders so they are not a forgotten minority. You can sign the <u>Barnabas Fund Petition</u> online here, or a paper copy in Church.
- 3. Actions speak louder than words, so we invite those attending our Harvest Services to make a monetary donation towards a special appeal for Syrian Christians. Yes, all Syrians are suffering, but the Christians from Syria face the more uncertain future.

Ayton's Famous Son

Have you visited the newly refurbished museum to Great Ayton's famous son - the seafarer, explorer, circumnavigator and cartographer, Captain James Cook? If not, then you have missed a treat.



The museum has recently reopened after being extended into the ground floor.

You now enter into a bright shop with lots of Cook memorabilia for sale to suit all ages. The friendly volunteers are their to welcome you, and the day I went Christine Moore and Kath Marsh were doing an excellent job of welcoming visitors and you could see how much they enjoyed it.

Go upstairs and you are in Great Ayton's oldest school, the Postgate School, without which James Cook would never have had his education and may never have gone on to achieve what he did.

The displays tell you of the school, Cook and his journeys, the local area and even other Aytonians who have given much to our village. Can you guess who?

The museum is now free to attend, and they just ask you make a donation in appreciation, if you have enjoyed your visit. There is good access for the disabled.

For those more energetic and fancy a walk around the historic places on interest in our village, try the Audio trail. For a ± 10 hire charge, you get a recorded history to walk you around the village and explain the local landmarks. The museum closes the end of October, so be quick if you want to see it this year.

Compassion -Transform a child in Jesus' name

Since Easter a group of families from the Come and Praise service have been sponsoring two children, Lucy, 9 and Naftaly, 6, both from Kenya through Compassion.



Compassion is an organisation dedicated to helping Christians put their faith into action, just as Christ calls us to, by caring for the poor and giving hope to those in need. By sponsoring Lucy and Naftaly with Compassion we are providing them with the skills and opportunities they need to break free from property and fulfil their God-given potential.

The benefits of our sponsorship will also be felt throughout Naftaly and Lucy's families and community. Children assisted by Compassion often teach the rest of their family what they learn in the projects they complete. Compassion partners through local churches in developing countries to identify those children in greatest need.

Our sponsorship will provide Lucy and Naftaly with bible teaching, tuition, school uniforms, mosquito nets, medical care and income generating activities. The project will also provide their parents with invaluable parenting education. The financial support given to the children makes a huge difference to their lives, but the relationships that are formed through sponsorship inspire hope and a future, and encourage them to overcome the apathy and fatalism of poverty.

Lucy has 2 brothers and 3 sisters and lives at home with her parents. After school she plays hide and seek with her friend Jane and helps around the home. She is currently learning to read the bible on her own.

Naftaly is 6 and lives in Kieni, a hillside community, with his mother, father and three sisters. He attends church weekly. In his recent letter he mentions how he has been taught (by the project) to keep his nails short and the importance of using a handkerchief. His favourite bible story is David and he enjoys going to Sunday school.

It costs $\pounds 21$ per month to sponsor each child, which is funded as a group contribution. We took the decision to sponsor two children on interest we received, but unfortunately we are currently not getting enough money to cover both children. If you feel like you would like to become involved so that we are able to continue to support Lucy and Naftaley escape poverty, please contact Vicky Gawthorpe (723090) for further details. It can be as little as 50p per week.

As well as our financial commitment to these two children we are encouraged to pray regularly for them so please remember them in your prayers. In a recent letters from Naftaly and Lucy they told us that they pray for us and our church!

Archbishop Sentamu and the Dea



Christ Church was packed for the Stokesley Deanery Service on Sunday 22nd September - and with good reason, for this year we welcomed our Archbishop to be with us. With his characteristic friendliness and humour, the

Archbishop led our service of commitment and renewal, as we celebrated the faith in our Churches and recommitted ourselves for the future.

The Archbishop gave an enjoyable and challenging address that covered many areas of our discipleship, and if you missed it, you can hear it on the <u>Church website</u>.

The service began with a procession of candles, marking the light of faith already within our Churches, and after the Archbishop's address, the

congregation were invited to receive anointing as a sign of renewal. Nearly all of the congregation went forward at this time, revealing our desire to be better disciples for Jesus in our communities.





Following some presentations to the Archbishop towards the end of the service to mark our appreciation of his visit, he then led the singing congregation out of Church and into the Church Hall for a glass of wine.

A Call From on High

Churches mark their anniversaries in various ways, but in November, 1955, Holy Trinity Church, North Ormesby, hit on a novel approach with an Eastern touch to celebrate its 86th anniversary.



Several hundred people assembled in the market place

to listen to the chanting of a white-robed figure perched on a floodlit platform on top of the 70-foot-tall church tower.

The event was based on the custom of the muezzin of Eastern countries who call the Mohammedan faithful to prayer from their minarets. The chanting was performed by Mr Joe Russon, a steelworks labourer and lay preacher and choir member. He invoked passages from the Scriptures into a microphone which was connected to loud speakers.

The Vicar, the Rev. Nicholas Breene, spent several years in Eastern countries, as did Mr Russon during his wartime service.

The story is recounted in a booklet produced to mark the church's centenary. It also recalls the misfortunes of Miss Jean Newby, who joined the church team in 1963 as a deaconess. She was involved in a scuffle with a group of youths who were doing their best to spoil a Halloween party, an episode which led to a court case.

Then one day she entered the church to find the High Altar ablaze; fortunately the damage was not great and the charred altar was replaced with one from the Hostel of the Resurrection at Leeds.

Almost exactly a year later she went into church to discover that the safe had been burgled.

Obviously being a member of the clergy can have its moments!
