An Increasingly Religious World

We are living in what is becoming an increasingly religious world. From our own experience in this country, we can see the advances of secularism and it's easy to assume that the rest of the world is following us, with faith being marginalised.

The truth is different. Outside of Western Europe, most societies are seeing an increase in religious affiliation. At present around 75% of the world's population adhere to a religion, with Christianity and Islam being the dominant two. By 2050 the number of religious people is expected to grow to 80% of the world's population.

If we are to understand people we need to understand the religion that makes them tick. This makes RE one of the most important lessons that can be taught in schools today, as well as engaging positively through collective worship and assemblies, if we are not to remain ignorant of each other.

In the Middle East we are seeing conflict growing with religion at its heart, as the fighters of the "Islamic State" seek to impose a new Caliphate on ancient lands. They are driving ancient communities of Christians and others, through force and fear, from lands they have lived in for 2,000 years or more. The scenes of barbarity and brutality are quite shocking, and what ever we see on TV is but the tip of the iceberg.

It has been said by several writers that these fanatics - who are feared as much by mainstream Muslims - are seeking to fulfil the end time prophecies preparing the way for the end of the world. Christians, Yazidis and others will be expelled from the Middle East - and then they will turn to the Jews! If the Islamic State get too strong, then we have even bigger worries ahead.

As Christians, we have seen several end time sects in our own faith who claim the end of the world, and these things tend to have a violent end. In 1993 in Waco, Texas, 76 followers of David Koresh and the Branch Davidians met a violent end in a siege and fire. The dead included families of women and children too.

How do we combat such goings on? Well you can fight force with force, and we are seeing an alliance based on America drop more and more bombs on the area. Sadly this may be the lesser of two evils, for if not stopped in their tracks all the Christians will soon be eradicated from the Middle East. It's easy to criticise force, but its hard to stand back when you see such suffering.

The bigger battle though, is to fight against ignorance, and that can only be done with knowledge. We need to know what they believe, and most importantly what we believe too, and put all these beliefs under scrutiny. Religion is not about believing 10 impossible things before breakfast each day. It needs to be thought through and details checked, for who wants to live and die for a falsehood.

We also need to ensure that the Church remains strong and confident, for the message of Jesus of Nazareth is the hope of peace for the world today. It will do none of us a service if the Christian voice with its call for peace and reconciliation is either silenced or misrepresented.

That is why here at Christ Church through our *Giving in Grace* initiative we are looking to ways to strengthen our own Church community here in Great Ayton. We are also are trying to help ensure that the Church remains even in the poorer areas of our Diocese by supporting the provision of clergy there too. In addition, we are seeking to do our bit to support Christians overseas who are going through such trials. We have been blessed in so many ways living in Great Ayton and belonging Christ Church, that we want to reach out with that blessing to others.

Our Giving in Grace initiative began last month, and we are inviting all who share our vision to join with us in ensuring the Church's voice and presence remain strong. We can't be responsible for others, but we can ensure we do our bit.

Regular A sign of commitment is ensuring our Giving comes even when we don't. We can do this by either using the dated Weekly Offering Envelopes or by making a Standing Order with our Bank and give the same amount each week or month. If we don't do this we may end up giving weakly instead!

Realistic This means giving a realistic amount to the Church. A £1 coin may seem big to a child (unlikely, but go with me) but take it shopping and it goes nowhere. Our Giving should reflect our generosity. It should be a response to how blessed we feel we are. As I drive back into Great Ayton and see Roseberry Topping and Captain Cooks Monument before me, I constantly give thanks that I live here. I feel similar thoughts when I go out to other Churches. We are so blessed.

Responsible Money is hard to come by, that is why as a Church we work to reduce unnecessary expenditure where possible so we can maintain our generosity. As individuals we can help by maximising our gift where we can by Gift Aiding our giving if we are a UK Tax Payer. By simply signing a Gift Aid declaration we can add 25p to every £1 we give. If we are giving by Weekly Envelopes or Bankers Order, this is easy to monitor and adds considerably to our Gift. If we do ever give spontaneously, perhaps at a funeral or wedding, always look for the yellow Gift Aid Envelopes in the pews.
