

# Can Good Come Out of Evil?



The Western world was shocked and galvanised into protest in January, when journalists at the Paris office of *Charlie Hebdo* - France's equivalent to *Private Eye* - were murdered in cold blood. A few days later more people were killed simply because they were Jewish.

What had caused these deaths? For the former it was that they had dared to feature the prophet Mohammad in cartoons, and many Muslims consider him above any criticism whatsoever. For the latter it was simply to do with race.

Can this be right, that any religion or religious person be above criticism or searching enquiry? I would answer a categorical **No!** If we don't use our reason to check what we believe, then as the saying goes, we are required to believe 12 impossible things before breakfast each day. Both the Jewish and Christian Faiths have faced deep and searching scrutiny of their beliefs and claims. When I was at University studying Theology we were required to approach things with an enquiring mind, for our God wants our willing response, not one forced upon us through fear.

In the past the Christian world has seen in itself some things we are now horrified about in extremist Islam. The days of the Inquisition brought much horror, and the abuses of faith brought about a Reformation in the Church in the sixteenth Centuy as it re-examined its life and beliefs.

The Muslim world is facing this issue now that Christians faced hundreds of years ago. We are constantly told that Allah is merciful and compassionate, yet our TV screens are filled with news of horrific acts not worthy of any God - ethnic cleansing, rapes, executions, beheadings of civilians, training young children to kill, attacking unarmed civilians etc. Mainstream Muslims need to regain control of their faith, for if they allow extremists to make the Agenda by keeping quiet, they can't complain if the world sees them as all the same. As Edmund Burke said All that is necessary for the triumph of evil is for good men to do nothing.

Let's be fair, as there are always two sides to every issue. We also need to rediscover respect for each other, and for ourselves, in the world today. Comments in papers from both reporters and the public, can often be cruel and inaccurate, and inflammatory language can be used. I looked online to see some of the Charlie Hebdo cartoons, and I have to say many seemed fairly innocuous to me, but sometimes we can cross the border of respect.

Let's hope and pray that some good may come out of the evil we have seen.

### An Increase in Church Weddings

Back in May 2012, clergy from the 12% of Parishes in York Diocese who did 49% of the weddings, were called together for a two day Wedding Conference. This was run by the National C of E Wedding Project that was seeking to reverse the decline of Church weddings. I was invited for in 2009 we had a good year with 14 weddings, but the decline was evident and by 2011 we were down to 6 at Ayton and 2 at Newton (a good year for Newton!)

Since then I have attended Wedding Fairs at Whinstone View, Stokesley Town Hall, a couple at Gisborough Hall, and we have had our own at Christ Church. As well as meeting many young couples, you also have the pleasure of

meeting other suppliers and it is really enjoyable. Both Whinstone View and Kiss the Bride

Magazine have been very supportive in wel-

coming me and supporting the Church presence. The results of this can be seen in the numbers 2012 - 18 weddings, 2013 - 18 weddings, 2014 - 22 weddings, and this year we have 24 booked.

As well as the weddings, this also brings more young people into our Churches, and at Newton some have continued coming. It also puts extra finance into both the local Church and the Diocese. And yes, it also gives me a captive audience for puppets and magic at wedding ceremonies!

Here are two comments from last year's weddings:-

"We both loved our wedding day and we thank you for officiating, you really made our wedding something special and created memories that will last forever. All our family and friends thought you were brilliant, remarking that it was the best wedding service they have been too."

"Just wanted to say thank you for an amazing ceremony. You did exactly what it said on the tin because all everyone talked about was the service and we wanted the service to be the main event and it was. We had the best day of our lives it was the perfect day."

Taking a Church wedding is an incredible privilege and a great joy. It gives you chance to make a good impression for the Church, and hopefully open some doors. May I record a big thank you to all who have helped us reverse the trend here, and to all the other providers it is a joy to work with.

## **Church Parades**

Did you know that our Uniformed Organisations attend Church Parades at Christ Church every two months?

We are fortunate in having good links with both the Scouting and Guiding Movements in Great Ayton. Our Scouts are a Church Sponsored Group and have their headquarters on church land at the peppercorn rent on £1 a year. They do pay to maintain their own Scout Hut.

Our Guides, Brownies and Rainbows, are not a Church group, but meet in our Church Hall every Friday evening and are not charged any rent. This is our way of supporting our young people and those who work with them.

At Church Parades we welcome them to the Sunday Service. Quite often the young people will assist in the address. Here are a Scout and a Guide helping to explain the Baptism of Jesus by making a jam sandwich between them.







The message was simple. Before you start on anything big you prepare, like washing hands before preparing food or eating.

Co-operation is essential, for God works through us, and doesn't force Himself upon us.

There is great reward in serving God, for not only are we nourished, we enjoy ourselves too.

We do all this because Jesus set us his example to follow.

Our thanks to our two volunteers who looked as though they were enjoying this too. The message of Jesus in a jam sandwich!

# Good Neighbour Scheme.

A locally-based project which provides support to older or vulnerable people in need is calling for volunteers to help support other people in their community. The Good Neighbour Scheme is run by Stokesley and District Community Care Association. It was set up after a successful bid for funds from NHS Hambleton Richmondshire and Whitby Clinical Commissioning Group's small grants scheme.

The idea of the scheme is that older and more vulnerable adults can contact Community Care if they need some support or assistance to carry out some everyday tasks. This can include collecting a prescription, assistance with reading letters, shopping or more general tasks that a 'good neighbour' could carry out. These could be one-off requests or a regular task.

Phil Henderson, the Manager at Stokesley and District Community Care Association, said: "There are people out there who need help carrying out simple every-day tasks that most of us take for granted. We know there are people in local communities who would be willing to help if they knew about someone in need. Hopefully this scheme will match them up, supporting people to live independently in their own homes."

Happy New Year from the Stokesley School Churches Youth Workers!

The New Year is both a time to look back and a time to look ahead to the new opportunities ahead.

In representing the churches of the area, we provide a Christian presence in the school and we support students of varied backgrounds and beliefs. We find the students are respectful and show genuine interest in our input there. Those students who have an active Christian faith often comment that they love



to have their youth workers in both school and in youth clubs in the community.

We provide a listening ear to many who just need to chat or simply want to share their day with us, we provide support where needed in Religious Education lessons and we provide activities for young people to attend.

The past term we saw a new intake of Year 7s and we were able to do our "What is a Christian" lesson. This allows students to explore what Christians believe and to ask questions. It is always a highlight of the year. We were also pleased that our Rock Solid lunch-club continues to be well attended and new students of different year groups have come along.

Out of school, we have had a renewed interest for our monthly event "Café Church". This is ran by Neil and local youth workers in our Stokesley catchment area. We find that young people can connect with God in an informal way and join in the faith discussions going on.

Our Basketball club which is held in the Sports Centre is ran to encourage young people both to have fun, to learn a new sport but also to adopt positive values but we have found through friendships built, that some of the young people have invited their friends to attend church youth groups. They have adopted the name "The Stokesley Raptors" and we are thrilled the young people have taken ownership of this activity.

Please continue to pray for our work and for the school. Pray for the students we meet and for the great staff there who are work incredibly hard.

# Thinking of a Christening?

If you are, you are not alone, for between Christ Church and Saint Oswald's Church we do around 40 Christenings each year.

By wanting a Christening, you are saying something from deep within yourself that you wish God to play a part both in your life and the life of your child. We all need something to guide us in life, and the Christian faith remains an excellent way for people to live their lives following the example of selfless love set by Jesus.

Our Christenings take place in all three of our Churches - Christ Church and All Saints Church in Great Ayton and Saint Oswald's Church in Newton under Roseberry. (All Saints just in summer months as there is no heating!)

We don't make parents jump through hoops beforehand, but we encourage them to follow up afterwards by maybe attending a family service, Little Fishes or Who Let the Dads Out.



Christenings usually take place outside a normal Sunday Service - although they can by request take place within one. This us usually because the number of guests can be so large, we can't always fit people inside the Churches with the Sunday congregation. Also this means the service can be much longer - which doesn't make it baby friendly.

We normally just Christen one baby at a time, as we like to involve all that baby's Godparents and family in the service, by reading a lesson, saying prayers, and as you can see above, even big sisters are asked to help sign with the cross.
