

As we look back on 2014 my feeling is one of thankfulness for the many positives we have seen in the life of our Church.

We saw the retirement of some long-standing Church Officers and workers. Rosemary stood down as Churchwarden and Ken Bellamy as Vice Chairman of the PCC. I have always valued their wise counsel over the years. In the Church Office, Jennifer Roberts also took a well deserved retirement. Getting the right people into roles is always the most important thing, and we have done well with Vicki Nath becoming

Churchwarden, Rosemary kindly keeping her experience in use as Vice Chairman, and Sarah Botez has brought a cheerful efficiency into the office - even coping with Windows 8! All joining a first rate team who serve our Church.

In the life of our Church we have seen blessings in many ways

- Whilst numbers at traditional services have dropped slightly, overall they have been maintained by increases in the new services and ventures, like Come & Praise, Little Fishes, Alternatives and Who Let the Dads Out.
- We have had a most successful Giving in Grace campaign, to help further the work of our Church both within and outside of our Parish, helping us maintain our generous response to the Diocese.
- We have seen great increases in weddings (22)in the patch, and even at Christ Church (11), giving us the privilege to be part of people's lives. We celebrate this too with all the Baptisms (32) and Funerals (43) as people still see Christ Church as an important part of their lives.
- We have had an appeal to help Syrian Christians, and the most successful Christmas Appeal ever, this time for Roseberry School in Darjeeling, India, which contributed to over £34,000 for charity in the year.
- We have had many good services here, and have been able to share our blessings with others as the staff help out at other Churches.

My thanks to all the people who help in so many ways in making Christ Church such a lively Church. Come along and hear more our Annual Church Meeting on Wednesday 18th March in the Parochial Hall at 7.30pm and show your support.

The Vicar welcomed everyone to the meeting which began with a Bible reading and a prayer.

Election of Churchwardens

We propose to say a special thank you to Rosemary on Easter day for all she has done in the last 8 years, but for the time being we gave a huge round of applause.
- We are grateful to say that we have two nominations for Churchwarden for this year.
- We welcome Martin Simmons back after a good year last year and welcome Vicki Nath to the team.
- Vicki Nath had been proposed by Rosemary Wheway and seconded by Ken Taylor.
- Martin Simmons had been proposed by Eric Boyce and seconded by Enid Sedgwick.
- There were no further nominations and they were duly elected and welcomed as Churchwardens for the coming year.

Minutes of Meeting held 20th March 2013

- The minutes of last year's Annual Parochial Church Meeting had been circulated with the Annual Report. It was noted that Mrs Jean Cumbor was present but not recorded.
- The minutes were proposed by Gordon Wood and seconded by Martin Simmons. All agreed.

Matters Arising from the Minutes

There were no matters arising.

Electoral Roll Report

Alison Lambert reported that following the revision of the roll for 2014, which closed on 9th March, the number appearing on the Roll is now 287, a net increase of 17 for the year. This net increase is due to 22 new applications being accepted, I member being added through the year as their 16th birthday was reached and 6 names being removed from the list. There are still a significant number of church members who are not on the Roll. Applications for enrolment can be accepted after the conclusion of the Annual Meeting and throughout the year not just at the Annual Revision. Thanks were expressed to Alison for her work on the Electoral Roll. The number on roll affects the number of places on the Deanery Synod and as the number on roll is now below 300 we have one less place on the Deanery Synod.

Presentation of the Annual Report for 2013

The Annual Report for 2013 has been published and distributed in several formats, including on the website and in paper copy.

Thanks were given to all those who have contributed their written words to the Annual Report but also for all the work that they carry out during the year to make Christ Church such an active and lively church.

Formal adoption of the report was proposed by Ken Taylor and seconded by Martin Simmons and agreed by all present.

Financial Report & Presentation of the Audited Accounts for year ending 31st December 2013

Ken Taylor presented the financial report for the year ending $31^{\rm st}$ December 2013 – full details of the income and expenditure are available in the Annual Report.

The Parish Share has been replaced by The Freewill Offering.

The Gift Aid Small Donations Scheme has started.

There has been a record level of charitable giving this year -£36,773 paid out to approximately 50 different organisations.

New tax changes mean that we have to operate as a small business.

Highlights of the financial year were:

- o Unrestricted surplus = £4,362
- o Restricted deficit = £3,689
- o There is £51,525 in reserves

Ken Taylor gave a brief overview of the budget for 2014-2015.

- o Details of the budget set were outlined.
- o This includes £82,500 to be given as our Parish Freewill Offering to the Diocese and £13,700 for projects which need to be carried out urgently. Projects include the removal of asbestos from the old boiler house, the refurbishment of the bells and the upgrading of the church electrics.
- o Based on the budgeted income and expenditure, it shows that the in-year accounts will show an £8,000 deficit as the accounts have run with significant surpluses for a number of years this allows a deficit budget to be set.

The finances were proposed by Ken Bellamy, seconded by Gordon Wood and all were in favour.

Ken expressed his sincere thanks to the Sidespeople and Helen Dickinson, Sheila Levett and Jean Goat who all help him to manage the church's money. Thanks were given to the 194 members of planned giving schemes, 155 of which also gift-aid. Ken made a request that, when shopping on line, you register on the www.easyfundraising.org.uk site as this will donate an amount to your chosen charity each time you make a purchase.

The Vicar thanked Ken Taylor for all his work on the accounts – it was acknowledged that every year work on the finances has become more and more involved and complicated and it is very much appreciated that church is in such good hands.

Child Protection Report

The Child Protection Report from Gail Juckes was read to the meeting: 'Safeguarding' or 'Child Protection' remains an important part of the Church's commitment and 'Protecting All God's Children' is our policy from the Diocese of York. At Christ Church we have adapted and adopted this policy and a copy is available at the back of the church.

Legislation requires that anyone applying for a position in the church which involves significant contact with children has to be checked by the DBS (formerly CRB) before taking up any employment, paid or unpaid. If the contact with children is only occasional, a Confidential Declaration is all that is necessary. As Child Protection Officer, I keep up to date with the changes in Child Protection legislation and keep records checked. All information on the DBS (Disclosure and Barring Service) and the Declaration Forms is confidential and safely stored.

The Diocese of York provides a consultant, Sue Roughton, and a part-time in-house advisor, Sarah Harrison, who may be contacted on 07551 124951 by parishes or members of the public or via me if anyone has any concerns referring to children within our parish.

The Vulnerable Adult policy now deems that Church Visitors are not required to complete a DBS form.

The Vicar's Comments

The Vicar gave his report for the past year:

27 baptisms and I Thanksgiving Service, some of which were beamed to Sweden, Canada and other places.

12 weddings in 2013 with 11 weddings and 1 blessing booked for 2014

Christ Church hosts its own wedding fair and this gives the opportunity to break down barriers and introduce people to a friendly church

31 church funerals and 21 crematorium funerals

Little Fishes continue to thrive and are well supported

Sunday School has good attendances and a host of interesting activities. Teachers at local schools say they can tell who comes to Sunday School as they are able to answer the R.E. questions!!

Come and Praise is on the 2nd Sunday of each month with additional dates for Easter and Mothering Sunday. One Sunday last year Come and Praise was in Saint Margaret's as Christ Church was being used for a wedding fair. Other special services were held throughout the year for children and families, Good Friday workshops, Garden Service, Love in a Box, Christingle, Church Parade.

Confirmation Service was taken by Bishop Gordon Bates – several candidates came through our Discipleship Group

- Archbishop Sentamu came to the Stokesley Deanery Service, hosted in Christ Church in September.
- Another successful praise and party service was held in September.
- A wonderful weekend at Wydale was enjoyed by a number of congregation members.
- An enjoyable coffee morning, a charity auction, a choir concert and a memorial concert have been held.
- Attendances at Christmas has increased particularly the Crib Service although average weekly attendance is falling slightly.
- Church reached out with regular monthly collections for the foodbanks in addition to Harvest. These collections are taken each month by Gordon & Dorothy Wood.
- Our charitable giving has included Special appeals for charities, PCC giving, as well as church based charity groups, eg the Children's Society.
- Church also reach out with visits to people from our church visitors, involvement with local school, participation in community activities (eg helping in the Discovery Centre, participating in the Panto), civic services. The church supports the community.
- Nick Land has stepped down from running the Firm and Neil Harris has been joined by Julie Bourke, Helen Dickinson and Claudia Kirby.
- Ann Whittaker stepped down as Foundation Governor at Marwood School after approximately 30 years and was replaced by Vicky Bradley.
- Roger Arkell retired after 18 years as Custodian of All Saints Church and we await news as to who will be the new Custodian.
- Eric Boyce stepped down as Churchwarden and was very ably replaced by Martin Simmons.
- This year Rosemary Wheway is taking a well earned break from her years as Churchwarden. She has attended numerous committees, helped to work out policies, including the Child Protection Policy, has helped to run some of the confirmation groups, organised sidesmen for the services, planned trips including York and Whitby, arranged parties and coffee mornings. She always has a willing smile, a listening ear and wise counsel. She has always been available to read in church whenever readers are absent. She has led the team of church visitors and is a Marwood governor. Words cannot express how appreciative we are of her and how glad she will not be leaving us completely.
- We need to learn more about being a generous church; of finding new ways to find new disciples and to make old ways effective; and to support the other churches in the area by being involved in the Deanery and the Diocese.

The Vicar thanked all the Parish Staff, the organisations, all the people who are vital to the running of the church, to our congregation for turning out in bad weather as well as good and Thank you also to God.

The Vicar thanked all present for their contributions to the meeting.

Ken Bellamy thanked Paul for his work, his energy and all that he does with our church and on behalf of everyone, wished to say 'THANK YOU SO VERY MUCH AND WELL DONE. Please carry on the good work'.

CHURCHWARDENS' REPORT

The congregation can be reassured that the church silver and other items of value continue to be safe and records continue to be updated and safe.

2014 has seen the congregation of Christ Church continue to be active and welcoming. "Alternative style" services are still a regular feature and this year has seen the start of "Who Let The Dads Out" which has attracted several new Dads and their young children. The ongoing Giving in Grace campaign has been a success so far both in the financial appeal and in the aim of growing our church in mission and faith.



Regular building maintenance issues have been addressed as well as several larger projects. Remedial painting, gutter clearing, tree pruning and testing of portable appliances etc. have all been attended to. Asbestos has been removed from the old boiler room achieving a safe storage area below the church. The tubular bells have been temporarily removed for repair but should be back in situ by Easter for us to enjoy before services and wedding for many years to come.



The 1899 Binns pipe organ is in need of major restoration. We have applied for an historic organ certificate and await the decision regarding this. In order to pay for the restoration we are working in partnership with the Halifax Organ Academy towards an Heritage Lottery Fund grant application combining organ restoration and multimedia equipment installation. An important part of the grant application is to set up a Friends of Music group and to hold 12

organ workshops and concerts over the next 3 years for the people of Great Ayton. A trial run of these workshops in August was a great success which we hope to replicate. The grants are very competitive to obtain so we will need a plan B if we are not successful.

In All Saints Church the window in the south wall of the chancel has been replaced. In the coffee lounge the office wall has been removed and cupboards built for storage purposes. Further refurbishment of the coffee lounge is still planned.

We would like to thank the many people involved in keeping the church and grounds both looking beautiful and services running smoothly. We greatly

appreciated having the help of the scouts before Remembrance Sunday to clear leaves in the church grounds. There are many unsung heroes who commit themselves on a regular basis to rotas that enable church life to continue. Special thanks also go to our vicar Paul supported by Geoff, Jon, Margaret and Peter for their leadership and hard work.

PCC Secretary Report 2014

Since the last Annual Church Meeting in March, the PCC and Standing Committee have met on 5 and 6 occasions respectively. These meetings were well attended and the effective running of our church was discussed.

Meetings of the All Saints Committee, Ayton Churches Together Committee, Hall Committee, Projects and Fabric Committee and Parish Life and Young People Committee were held throughout the year with reports given at the full PCC meetings.



Unfortunately I am unable to share a photograph of the PCC members as they work **invisibly** behind the scenes. However, I know you will agree that we must **thank all our PCC members** for their enthusiasm and commitment.

Amongst their many tasks (although possibly not without professional help!) our Churchwardens have removed asbestos, chopped down trees, repaired the vestry, choir vestry, porch, north wall of the nave and the chancel arch as well as organising organ workshops, electrical repairs and the refurbishment of the bells.

An important focus for our church this year has been the progression of our Giving in Grace Campaign, which has allowed us to acknowledge how blessed we are in our lives



and find a way to share that blessing with others. Once again, Paul has shown us how good it is to support one another and how we are able to make a difference within our village, throughout the Diocese and overseas.

Financial Report 2014

Financially, 2014 was another eventful year as we sought to implement a new stewardship programme following our generous offer to the Diocesan Common Fund made the previous year. Following a lengthy period of preparation, we finally launched **Giving in Grace** during September and October. This, however, gave us insufficient time to generate an increase in planned giving to the levels required and consequently we suffered a deficit of £16,290 on our General Funds against a budgeted loss of £9,000 for the year.



Despite this setback, our reserves remained at £35,235 which represents 3 months of general fund expenditure, still within our targeted range. The results of Giving in Grace were however sufficiently encouraging to indicate that we will recover some of this loss in 2015.

Unrestricted income fell from £120,760 last year to £117,519. In addition to the lower than expected planned giving, we also suffered falls in the general level of donations and fee income. We again took full advantage of the Gift Aided Small Donations Scheme (GASDS) which allowed us to collect an additional £1,250 in tax rebates.

Unrestricted expenditure showed an increase from £116,398 in 2013 to £133,810 this year. This was largely the result of our generous donation of £82,500 to the Diocesan Common Fund. Other operating costs were generally held in line with the budget and we were able to proceed with two important repair/refurbishment projects viz removal of asbestos from the old boiler house (£6,427) and further stonework/drainage and associated plaster repairs to the north wall (£3,169).

We donated £8,000 to mission giving from general funds. As well as our usual support for the Tees Valley Youth for Christ project at Stokesley School, we also gave to two other important local projects, namely the Middlesbrough Food Bank and Stockton Parish Church to support their work with asylum seekers.

During the year we ran two major appeals. At Harvest, we supported the work of Canon Andrew White at St Andrew's Church in Baghdad. For the Christmas appeal this year, we decided to support School Aid India, a charity established by Ayton resident Helen Jones to run Roseberry School for the poorest children in Darjeeling, northern India. A record total of £2,837.45 was raised for this very worthy cause.

Overall, our mission giving from funerals and weddings, special services, appeals, and donations from general funds reached the excellent total of £34,848, distributed among 42 different charities – which again demonstrates the enormous generosity of the people of this parish (see attached table for full details).

The Church Hall had a satisfactory year with reserves returning to a more healthy level of £4,926. All Saints Church however still gives cause for concern as income from visitors and services is barely sufficient to fund essential maintenance and operating costs.

And finally, to all those who help to manage the finances - Helen Dickinson, Jean Goat, Sheila Levitt, Robin Harmar and the sidespeople – a huge thank you to you all!

Stokesley Deanery Synod

2014 saw the election of Parish representatives to Deanery Synod. As the Electoral Roll had fallen our allocation changed from 5 to 4 representatives. These are Nick Land, Rob Pepper, Craig Cartwright and Rosemary Wheway. The clergy and readers also attend.

Each year the Deanery organises Lent services and in 2014 these included a talk followed by a short service in Stokesley Parish Church.

There were three meetings in 2014 with informative talks at each of them - all members of the congregations were invited to the talks. In February Rev Clay Roundtree spoke of his visit to St Michael's Anglican Primary School in our link diocese in S Africa. In June we heard of new activities being planned in the Archdeaconry for children and young people by Revs Jo and Andy Bowden. This was followed in November by a very informative talk from Heather Black. She is the Development Officer for Middlesbrough Together and spoke of her work with the Church Urban Fund. At the end of this she was presented with our cheque which was part of the Mission Giving for this year.

Safeguarding

Safeguarding (Child Protection) remains of paramount importance to the Church of England's family policies and as such I maintain our Church records and policies to keep them up to date.

The list of persons requiring a DBS clearance is shorter than it used to be in that not everyone now needs to be checked before commencing to work for the Church.

However, the last communication I had from the York Diocese Office informed me that the list may well be changed yet again so watch this space...

I attend meetings as required to keep up to date and to meet CPOs from other Churches in the York area. This is useful if we are unsure of any procedure as we can ask the appropriate people and the York Office is always very helpful.

Lastly may I ask that everyone be vigilant and keep an eye on our children. They are God's gift to us and no child deserves abuse.

All Saints Church

In my first Report as the new custodian of All Saints I would like to acknowledge Roger Arkell's seventeen years in the post. His enthusiasm and willingness to share his vast knowledge certainly helped in motivating me to accept the challenge of becoming custodian. I am still in the process of seeking advice about the role and getting to know those involved.

We continued to receive visitors from all over the U.K. and, indeed the world. Visitor numbers were slightly lower than the previous year, but this was probably explicable in terms of the very fine summer weather meaning a trip to the seaside was preferable to a museum or something similar. Of more long term concern was the fact the church was closed on up to a quarter of all available afternoons because of the lack of volunteers, and this again demonstrates that we need more guides. A special thanks to those guides who regularly sign up for weekend slots, always the hardest to fill, but at the same time, the most likely to attract

the Regrettably regular services at the church were suspended during the year congregations fell to unsustainable levels However, there were still a number Christenings and three special services -Summer Songs of Praise, Captain Cook Memorial and Candlelit Carols were 25 usual well



attended and enjoyable occasions. How can we realistically build on this and ensure that All Saints remains very much a living church as well as a wonderful historical monument?

In terms of the fabric of the church, the south chancel window was duly replaced by a specialist firm from York and the path leading to the front porch has again been strengthened. by the use of reinforced gravel. I an told that the obligation to keep the cemetery tidy, undertaken for the past five years by Richmondshire District Council under sub-contract is due to revert to Hambleton District Council and so it will be interesting to see whether standards are maintained. There is also the ongoing issue of the large old beech tree overhanging from the vicarage garden.

Some ideas to promote the existence and use of All Saints over the next two years are already in place, but further suggestions would be welcome.

Finally, a big thank you to all of those involved with All Saints, including the committee, guides, and especially those who undertake all the unsung task such as cleaning the brass, keeping the altar cloths clean, safety checks, tidying up, etc. You ensure that the church is in a fit and proper state to receive visitors and for services. The feedback received from locals and visitors suggests it is a very valued asset to the village.

Christ Church Visitors

We have had another successful year with the addition of two new Visitors bringing the total to 19. This has made it possible for us to visit 34 people on a regular basis. This year several Visitors have also made short term visits to people whose circumstances may have temporarily changed such as following a stay in hospital. This is a new venture and will be continued whenever it is needed.

We continue to meet regularly with the clergy so that they can monitor our visits and we review our guidelines annually. In 2014 we were given some excellent training from a member of the Cruse Bereavement Care and will continue to meet the training needs of those who visit.



Our aim is to visit anyone in the village in need – the housebound, lonely, sick and infirm – but this does not exclusively mean those who were regular churchgoers. We visit people mostly in their own homes but several of those visited eventually move out of the village to Care Homes and our Visitors travel as far as Catterick and Northallerton as well as Stokesley and Guisborough to stay in touch. They also visit hospitals if this is appropriate.

The group supports the monthly and Christmas Hollygarth services and also transports some of the people who would otherwise be unable to attend. These are open to **anyone** who appreciates a weekday afternoon service - not just the residents of Hollygarth.

In 2014 we hosted our third Praise and Party service followed by tea in the Hall. This attracted many for whom the 9.15 service is just too early. The total attending included 17 people personally invited of whom 4 were in wheelchairs. Everyone appreciated both the "praise" and "party" and we hope to host a similar event in 2015. Our new venture in 2014 was to take a selection of food after the party to those who were unable to attend. This was warmly welcomed.

We continue to deliver cards on the first anniversary of a bereavement and also a Welcome Pack whenever we see a removal van in the village.

These are very rewarding tasks and we would welcome more visitors so that we can extend our visits to more people. Please tell us if you know someone who would like a visit or you have new neighbours but more importantly **join us if you can!**

Bible Reading Fellowship (BRF)

Check out their website www.brf.org.uk

"An accessible yet stimulating aid to spending time with God each day" is offered with daily reading notes published by BRF. Their most popular edition here at Christ Church is New Daylight, currently used by 48 people



- three of whom use large print copies and two iphone/ipad apps.

Other editions used are Day by Day, Guidelines and Upper Room.

Some of the readers of New Daylight meet monthly in small groups in each other's homes using the notes as a starting point for wide ranging discussion on aspects of faith and its challenges for us as we try to live our daily lives in the light of what we learn. One of the New Daylight writers Andrew John gave us this helpful prayer at the end of a chosen bible passage and comment during last year.

Middlesbrough Food Bank

The regular monthly contribution to the Middlesbrough Food Bank from the congregations of Christ Church and the Quaker Meeting is considerable and much appreciated. It always involves at least one heavily laden car and, on several occasions two to three vehicles during the past year. £180 pounds cash has been given which our treasurer sends off to the Food Bank office to cover necessary transport costs.

Since starting up almost 8,000 food parcels have been given out from eight distribution centres across the town. Everyone knows that this should not be necessary in a modern affluent Britain but through delayed social security payments, unemployment, rising costs, ill health etc. some families do find themselves unable to afford basic necessities. The thought of young children and adults suffering consequently is



unbearable. Your contributions help to overcome this by a professional, carefully controlled temporary provision of food for three days to overcome this need.



New developments include "Cut the cost of cooking," a course which teaches how to cook on a budget and provides attendees with a slow cooker on completion. (Donated by a local firm, Cummins of Darlington). A professional debt advisor is to be available and links with credit unions have been set up. Volunteer staff are available to advise on agencies able to solve the longer term problems.

Please accept a sincere "Thank you," from the Food Bank staff but mainly from those who benefit from the generosity exercised by people from Great Ayton churches.

We launched this new monthly venture in September. Like many other churches, we have been seeking new ways to reach out to our younger adult male population. 


Ist Great Ayton Guides
