The recent concert with Pieces of Eight Singing Group - all nine of them! - Was a resounding success. They took us on a musical journey through the centuries from madrigals, to spirituals, and songs from shows and comic songs, most sung acappella.

Together with a super raffle, the evening raised £833 for Church Funds.

Freewill Offering At the last PCC Meeting, the PCC agreed to increase the amount we give to support the Diocesan Budget from £9,480 p.a. to £10,000. This money helps provide clergy in Parishes less well off than our own, as well as contibuting to training new clergy and pensions for older ones. Our increase came as a response to God's blessings to us in seeing

the number of weddings coming to our Church increase (17 this year and 14 booked already for 2016).

Lost in Translation!

Communication is a vital part of life today, what with mobile phones, i-pads, the internet, rolling TV news programmes and so on, but there is always the risk of misinterpreting or mishearing a message. We have all heard the hoary old joke about how "Send reinforcements, we are



going to advance" ended up as "Send three and fourpence, we are going to a dance." (How many of our young readers will be puzzled by 3s 4p?)

Even one mistaken letter can have far-reaching consequences. Robert Graves, for instance, in his autobiography, recounts how a slight error in Morse code during World War One led to a battalion being sent to Cork instead of York. It was decided later that Cork would do as well so the battalion stayed there for the remainder of the war.

During World War Two the RAF in the Middle East sent a message to London requesting 600 airscrews - and 600 airmen were sent round the Cape. A later signal read: "For airscrews read propellors."

Using codes can also lead to trouble. When Goa, Portugal's small enclave in India, faced the might of India in 1961 and was running short of a particular type of ammunition, the Portugese garrison commander sent an urgent request to Lisbon for further supplies, using the pre-arranged code word Chouricos, or sausages.

The Ministry of Defence in Lisbon, which had long forgotten the code word, duly dispatched a large consignment of spicy sausages to Goa by plane.

Still on the subject of communications, I liked the story of Captain Mervyn Wingfield, the first British submariner to sink a Japanese submarine in the Second Word War, who was on the bridge of the newly built submarine Umpire, being escorted north as part of a convoy, when he signalled to an escorting destroyer: "If I am attacked at night I intend to remain on the surface." Came back the sarcastic reply: "So do I."
