We Will Remember Them

On Remembrance Sunday we will gather again to remember all those young men from our village who gave their lives in the Two World Wars to preserve our freedom and our way of life and to help liberate all in those countries that had been occupied.

Remembrance isn't just about looking back to what has happened in the past, its also about committing ourselves to the present and the future to ensure we don't go down the road of war again by valuing what they fought for.

We have had peace in Europe for so long now we may be tempted to take it for granted, as indeed we may also take our society and its values for granted, so let us pause to remember some things to be thankful for.

We live in a society where everyone is equal before the law regardless of sex and race. It wasn't always so, and the suffragettes fought some tough battles to get the vote for women in 1918. In France it came in 1944, Switzerland in 1971 and in some parts of the world it still hasn't happened.

We have a society where people have the freedom of religious belief, where adherents of other faiths are free to erect their holy buildings and practice their faith, and they are met with considerably more tolerance and understanding here than Christians find in many other parts of the world.

Our society has grown in tolerance, with people of different sexual orientations now fully accepted into society, and with marriage between gays now being allowed in Law.

We have a country, that despite our grumbles, does have a good health service freely available to all in need, and a benefit system more generous than most.

We have education of a high standard open to all children, where the special needs of the disabled and disadvantaged are given special attention and are integrated within society and our schools. It doesn't happen everywhere.

We have the freedom to ask questions, and where respect has to be earned and not slavishly given. We can laugh at ourselves and the British sense of humour is something to be prized. We are a generous nation, maybe because of our Christian heritage, and we often lead the way in aid and charitable works. Even in our own village we see plenty of evidence of this.

Through our democracy we have a say in how our country is governed, and if we don't agree with what is done, we the people can hold the Government to account.

We have the most respected Monarch in the whole world as our Head of State that even the Chinese President wants to be seen beside our Queen.

We are a people who have given the world so many good things too numerous to mention.

All this can only be enjoyed today because in our past when danger threatened many young men and women from our communities went to fight for what they believed in.

On Remembrance Sunday let us remind ourselves of the heritage we enjoy because of their sacrifice and ensure we do all we can to preserve it for future generations.

Our village Act of Remembrance begins at 10.45am at the War Memorial. Do join us.

Poppies for Remembrance

Poppies have become the most iconic symbol of World War One. How did that come about?

Despite the mud and desolation of Ypres Salient, every Springtime the seeds of the red poppy flourished. A Canadian doctor, Major John McRae, ran a dressing station at Essex Farm, witnessing the physically and mentally wounded brought to him for surgery. Many survived, many others did not.

For Major McRae the red poppies and their green leaves gave him hope among the carnage and inspired him to write his famous poem "In Flanders Fields".

In Flanders fields the poppies blow Between the crosses, row on row, That mark our place; and in the sky The larks, still bravely singing, fly Scarce heard amid the guns below.

We are the Dead. Short days ago We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow, Loved and were loved, and now we lie In Flanders fields.

Take up our quarrel with the foe: To you from failing hands we throw The torch; be yours to hold it high. If ye break faith with us who die We shall not sleep, though poppies grow In Flanders fields.

Leading Your Church Into Growth - LYSIG

In September Enid Sedgwick and John Dickinson joined me at a pilot Conference at Scarborough called Leading Your Church Into Growth (LYSIG). We went because we believe that our Church could and should grow, and this was a chance to learn more and to share time with folk from across the Diocese in similar situations.



We worked hard, we prayed hard and laughed harder still, for Robin Gamble, the main speaker, has a wicked sense of humour that even the Archbishop wasn't safe from. I asked Enid and John to write a few words of their first impressions of the Conference, and this is what they said. Paul

Leading Your Church into Growth by Enid Our parish was one of twenty-eight parishes taking part. The conference began with lively worship of praise and thanksgiving. A daily pattern of inspirational worship was a vital part of the programme during the conference - a morning Eucharist, Evening Worship and Night Prayer.



Planting the desire for church growth and equipping church members with a strategy to create a plan for growth in their home parishes, was the aim of the teaching sessions – which were strongly laced with humour and skilfully led by a talented LYCIG team. Time to talk and listen to people from other parishes highlighted how fortunate we are in our churches at Great Ayton and at Newton. To keep our churches healthy we need a plan to ensure that we grow in numbers, in service and spiritually.

Leading Your Church Into Growth - by John. They say that what you get out of things is equal to what you put in, or words to that effect. We certainly put a lot into the three and a half days we were in Scarborough, and from my perspective we were amply rewarded.

The days were structured around prayer, with a Eucharist before breakfast, evening worship at 6pm and night prayer at 9.30pm. Between those services the day was structured into plenary sessions, workshops and the necessary breaks for refreshment and meals, with an hour or so personal time slotted in somewhere. It is not often that you experience focusing on one topic for such a period of time. The topic of course is growth, in spirit and numbers and service.



The first realisation was that growing the Church is the elephant in the room. We all know it is a priority, that if we want to survive we must grow, but we talk around it. Growth never 'headlines' our discussions, as if it is simply too big to take on in one go. In fact it is not, it needs to be brought to the front and orientate our prayers and actions. Growth is a natural consequence of a healthy Church.

The second lesson is that growth does not necessarily mean major change, but we do have to adapt. We have to embrace changes in society, for example social media, as that is how the next generation of Church members live their lives. One key thought – how would our Church need to look and act so that we, as individuals, would feel comfortable asking others along. This then leads to how we welcome people into the Church and nurture them and ourselves in the knowledge of Jesus Christ.

LYCIG did not offer quick solutions, but it did show how the culture of growth as a priority, combined with a focus on prayer and witness, should lead to a movement from maintenance to expansion of our mission.

The third key point was learned from the other attendees, that we in Great Ayton are very blessed with our membership and resources. With that comes the responsibility to use these blessings effectively and that facing such an obligation is not necessarily a comfortable place to be. Archbishop Sentamu summarised it; 'Everyone must encounter Jesus. Everyone must become a witness to Jesus Christ'.

LYCIG was a very positive experience. Growth is a priority we have to embrace, but we have the means at our disposal and, with God's grace, we can make it a normal part of our life in Great Ayton.

The Late Laurie Cowley - by the late Bill Kirby

It is printed now in tribute to two fine gentlemen that did so much for our community. Ed.

On reading the November issue of Spire, the name of Mr Laurie Cowley appeared whose familiar face was not there at this year's Remembrance Day Service, which has triggered me off writing this letter regarding Laurie.



It is almost a year since Laurie's death when the village lost one of it's valuable figures who was held in high esteem and well respected. I also lost a good friend.

When living at Hollygarth I was the Treasurer of the Hollygarth Residents Association and Laurie the Secretary, and we made a great team and worked well together.

Laurie took a great interest in life and as well as taking a great interest in the Royal British Legion, he was also a serving brother of the St John's Ambulance. Laurie was a familiar face around the Cenotaph on Remembrance Sunday where he laid the first wreath representing the Royal British Legion, with other organisations following on. He will be sadly missed.

In the year 2005 Laurie and I attended a Service of Thanksgiving and Remembrance at Eden Camp marking the end of World War Two, where Laurie took part in the parade and I was a spectator. Laurie was a maritime soldier and spent most of his service at sea.



Besides being my good friend he was also my hairdresser. He used to pop along and cut my hair before any special occasion like Remembrance Sunday. It cost a tot of whisky and a chat. A friend who will never be forgotten.

Laurie died 6 December 2013 Bill died 21 May 2015. RIP

We've had several adults move forward to having their faith confirmed by the Bishop and others who have returned to church worship after many years absence.


We say to new arrivals, 'I hope you like chaos – if you do then you're in the right place!' Our worship includes songs such as 'Great big God', the 'Building' song (wise man) & 'Walking, Jumping, Clapping for the Lord', storytelling, prayers and an amazing whole minute of silence!

We have our own Facebook Group with 61 members – its a closed group which enables parents, grandparents and helpers to keep in touch, posts, special notices and events are regularly picked up by 15 to 20 members.



Naturally children only stay with us at Fishes for about 3 years before they're off to nursery or school – they continue to join us once a month with their Dads at 'Who Let The Dads Out? Hopefully during their time with us they and their carers have discovered something of the love of God and the excitement of following Jesus.

During October we held our "Cards for Christmas" coffee morning and there was a good turnout, with several local charities having a stall. $\pounds 104.20$ was raised for our charity.




Recently, I held a Bridge Drive, which proved to be an enjoyable event, making \pounds 438 profit, which was very good.

Weddings next year

Only 1% of Church of England Parishes now do 26 or more weddings a



year. With 25 booked in already for 2016, Saint Oswald's is about to join the 1%. If we add both Churches together, we are even higher up. My thanks to the team of vergers and musicians who support me at both Churches. With more requests for recorded music, and now the potential for slideshows at Christ Church, the job is getting even more technical than before.

Children in Distress



On Saturday 17 October, Christ Church hosted the 26th Annual Service of Thanksgiving for the charity Children in Distress. Alisdair Barron, the Director of CID presented us with a beautiful icon of Christ Pantocrator (Christ in Majesty) as a thank you for the service and our support for the Charity over many years.

Children in Distress was founded in 1989 by John Walmsley, a Vicar from Essex who had gone to Romania with a convoy of aid when

the Iron Curtain came down and the former Communist Countries of Eastern Europe were opened up. In Romania John saw great poverty, and a particular issue with HIV/ AIDS amongst many of the young people caused by infected blood products. Back then, before many of the modern anti-viral drugs, we were all terrified of AIDS and in a poor country without the resources we have here, this situation was even worse.

The charity began by opening up a Children's Hospice in the town of Cernavoda, and to begin with it was staffed with British volunteers going out for spells. Supporting churches, like St Martin's in Middlesbrough where I was Vicar at the time, would have Baby Sundays and collect disposable nappies, baby powder, soap powder, powdered milk and all sorts of other things to stock the hospice.

Over the years things have changed. The staff is now all Romanian, and supplies are sourced locally. The advances in drugs have meant that many of the children who would have died, now live and adjust to living independently. St Laurence's is no longer a hospice for the dying, but a centre for Independent living. Praise God for medical advances.

There are still children who do need hospice or hospital care, or other forms of intervention, so Children in Distress run hospices, schools and centres for autism. You can see their work on their website<u>www.childrenindistress.org</u>

The Charity has also organised *Love in a Box* each Christmas for many years, where people are invited to fill a shoebox of Christmas Gifts for a child of a certain age (or an old person), decorate it and send it over for Christmas. Christ Church has been the focal point for this collection for many years, being well supported by the other Churches and local schools. See next page for details.


