Keeping Christ in Christmas



We are approaching the Christmas Season when we remember the birth of Jesus and the hope he gives to the world by proclaiming the Kingdom of Heaven, God's kingly rule that stands all our values on their heads.

The winter festival may have pagan roots, but the Christian faith sought to give it a more positive spin than just thinking of ourselves and having a big party. It is a time for thinking of others

less fortunate and doing something for them, as we remember what God has done for us. Just over a hundred years ago in the trenches of France on Christmas Eve, it was the remembering of Christ's message of peace that brought a cease-fire between the armies in the famous Christmas Truce that left to the ordinary soldier could well have continued. Christmas still encourages us with goodwill to others, maybe by our friendly greetings to strangers, or through our Christmas Appeal that will once again help Roseberry School in Darjeeling that suffered damage with the earthquake in the region earlier this year. Giving an education to poor children makes a life changing difference to them that ripples out to their families and communities.

It may be that cinemas won't show the Church of England advert featuring the Lord's Prayer - but this should come as little surprise when you remember many DJs refused to play Cliff Richard's Millennium Prayer 15 years ago. It's up to us to do something to ensure that Christ is a part of our Christmas, for if you take him out all you are left with is M & S! So what can we do?

Attend a Christmas Service in a local Church. In a time where Christians are being driven out of the Middle East and our politically correct society is becoming intolerant to our message, stand up and be counted and go to a Church Service this Christmas. You will never find a better choice of services to choose from, the churches will all be beautifully decorated, you will sings lots of songs you do know the words to, and you will see people you recognise already there.

Invite someone to go with you. If you already regularly go to a Church, then ask someone who doesn't normally go to join you. It is so much easier to do things when someone is there to share, and it increases our joy too. Perhaps it's someone who may need a lift. If you come to Church with empty seats in your car you have missed opportunities to share God's love. How many people are missing the chance of meeting with God in worship simply because the Christians who go to

Church never bother to ask them to join them. Make a difference to someone else this Christmas.

A Variety of Services and even an Archbishop! In Great Ayton and Newton under Roseberry we have a variety of services listed on page 3 to accommodate most tastes, but in addition this year we have a unique event. On Christmas Eve Archbishop Sentamu will be taking the Midnight Mass Service at Christ Church and preaching at it. This is part of his pilgrimage around the Diocese where he wants to meet and talk with ordinary folk who may not usually go to Church. He is in Stokesley Deanery the days leading up to Christmas, so if you would like to share Christmas Eve with our Archbishop, may I invite you to join us for Midnight Mass that begins at 11.30pm. The Archbishop will be beginning Christ-



mas Eve with prayers in Christ Church at 8am (time to be confirmed) then walking up through our village passed the queues at the butchers, and then on to Kildale to meet folk there. He will spend the rest of the day visiting Stokesley Market and attending the Crib Service at Stokesley Parish Church before returning to us in the evening. I am fairly safe in saying that this will be the first time in history that we have had an Archbishop of York take our service on Christmas Eve, so be part of it!

Give to or do something for someone who can't do anything for you. We exchange so much at Christmas, with cards and presents being swapped between us, so remember those not on your Christmas list who need support. We have our Christmas Appeal for School Aid India and also the Foodbank Collection at Christ Church on Sunday 20 December. (you may even like to include a Festive Treat like a selection box or chocolates.) Above all, watch out for your neighbours and especially those on their own. So many people find Christmas a hard time as others retreat into their families leaving them without contact for several days.

Christmas is the most wonderful time of year, when people look beyond themselves and show love to others. We do this because God so loved the world He gave us His son that first Christmas. Let us put Christ back into ours.

PCC Giving 2015

At November's Meeting of Great Ayton PCC, the members were asked to come with suggestions as to where some of our giving should go to for 2015. We already donate wedding and funeral collections to a charity of the family's choice and have a list of three charities to choose from for Christenings. In addition we also have Lent, Harvest and Christmas Appeals, Charity Auctions, Concerts and respond to any emergency Appeals as well as supporting Middlesbrough Foodbank on a monthly basis. So where has this money gone to.

£750 each to the Anglican Mission Charities - United Society, Church Mission Society and Church Army who support Mission overseas and at home. Also another £750 to support the work of the Children's Society.

The Following Charities were nominated for £1,000 each.

Mary's Meals - which provides meals to schoolchildren in Africa to encourage them to stay on in Education, thus transforming their lives.

Open Doors North East - working with Asylum seekers in the Tees Valley area helping give them a welcome in a practical way.

UCCF - who run Christian Unions at all our Universities, seeking to support students in their Christian faith at a significant time in their lives.

Together Middlesbrough - working with the poor on our own doorstep in Middlesbrough and East Cleveland.

Tees Valley Youth for Christ - that supports the Christian Youth Worker working in Stokesley Secondary School.

Anglican International Development - a small medical charity training clinical officers for work in South Sudan.

In addition, we are holding our Christmas Appeal for School Aid India which runs Roseberry School in Darjeeling, and our Charity Auction of Surplus Christmas Gifts will be to support Children in Distress.

Learning From History

On Friday 27th November Karen and I were very proud parents at Middlesbrough Town Hall watching our son David graduate with a BA Degree in History. He has achieved this despite his very hard start to life and a daily battle with cerebral palsy. He has shown us that the future is in our hands, and it can be different from what many assume.



The study of history is important to us for if we don't learn the lessons of history, then we are condemned to repeat them.

The first week of our honeymoon to Yugoslavia to a coastal town in Croatia had to be moved to Lake Bled in Slovenia as tanks were on the streets there. Two weeks after we flew out of Ljubljana airport it too was being shelled by Serbian artillery as the Balkan region went into meltdown. The cause was the death of the Communist leader Marshall Tito and the removal of Communism which had held disparate people together with an iron fist, and once removed their rivalries returned. The following years saw the whole area in conflict. The beautiful medieval city of Dubrovnik was shelled, but far worse was the massacre of 8000 Muslim men and boys in Srebrenica while the world watched on.

What a shame President Bush and Prime Minister Blair didn't remember this before they removed Saddam Hussein from Iraq, accusing him of having weapons of mass destruction that have never been found. His removal brought chaos to the country and made it increasingly hard for Christians to stay there, where they had been welcome under Saddam, and even his deputy was a Christian.

We have also removed Gaddafi in Libya, and you must decide for yourself whether we have made that country or the Middle East any safer as a result.

We are now talking about removing President Assad from Syria. Having wanted to arm his opposition a few years ago, we are now seeking to attack them (ISIS). The Millennium window we put into Christ Church reminds us that just 15 years ago we helped build an extension to an Armenian Evangelical Church in Aleppo through the Barnabas Fund, and the Christians there had photographs taken proudly showing it off. Catholic agencies now reckon that within 10 years Christians will no longer be in the Middle East, having been cleansed from the area - not by the tyrants we have deposed, but by those who replaced them.

Clear out a house and leave it tidy, and the devil returns with seven others even worse. Now where have I heard that before? Please pray for wisdom for our leaders.

We wish you a Happy Christmas and a Healthy 2016 - we look forward to seeing you in the spring.



PCC News From Great Ayton & Newton under Roseberry

Child Protection. Mrs Gail Juckes gave a report to the PCC telling us of the various tasks involved in keeping up to date with Child Protection issues. All who work with young people and others who fall into certain categories are put through full DBS checks on a regular basis. The organisations also keep consent forms giving permission to attend events and old ones are stored in the office.

Recognised Parish Assistants We unanimously agreed to support a further three people to participate in the next Recognised Parish Assistant Course. A further three as Rosemary completed the course earlier this year, and Rob Pepper was sponsored at the previous PCC Meeting and is awaiting the next course to start in the New Year. He will be joined by Enid Sedgwick, Lesley Miller and Nicky Pepper.

At Newton PCC we donated £150 each to United Society, Church Mission Society, Church Army and the Children's Society, as well as agreeing to support Roseberry School in Darjeeling again with our Christmas Appeal. As well as wedding and funeral collections going to charities nominated by the couples or families, from January we are extending this to Christenings as well, giving the same choice as at Christ Church of Zoe's Place Children's Hospice, Clic Sargeant or Daisy Chain to support. The Love in a Box Appeal at Newton brought in 35 boxes.

Work is to be done in the New Year to enhance the cremated remains area in the Memorial Gardens and 4 new convector heaters purchased for Church.
