10 Years On

It was ten years ago last month when we started having our first All Age Service at Saint Oswald's Church, Newton under Roseberry. We knew we were a small, ageing congregation and wondered what we could do to attract younger families into our worship. I didn't want us to simply swap one set of

people for another, so only would proceed with a new idea if the PCC and Congregation gave its backing to the idea and supported it. So the All Age Service was born, complete with puppets and magic, and it was short and to the point. Whilst many loved the Book of Common Prayer Communion Service, they responded very positively and Margaret Sanderson, (*Pictured*) one of the Churchwardens, took it upon herself to drop a line each month to couples who had any connection with us from weddings or Christenings to invite them to the service.

The All Age Service soon became the better attended service of the two services each month with numbers increasing from the mid teens to the late twenties very quickly, and the Christmas Special brought in 40 +.

When Saint Oswald's entered into the wedding scene a few years ago, the All Age Service gave a wonderful introduction to Church to young couples not used to attending, and now if you arrive late you have to look carefully for a seat!

What has been really good is to see how it has encouraged young folk to come along to the Communion Service as well, and last year we saw three of them Confirmed at Christ Church. On the 5th Sunday of January we had 46 people in Church for a Book of Common Prayer Communion Service, and several of these folk were from weddings in previous years who still come. Old style language doesn't have to be a barrier if you have welcome and good relationships.

Margaret died in 2010, but would be thrilled to see the service she helped to found grow so well, and to know that the welcome she extended has very much been carried on. My thanks to all at Newton Church for being generous in sharing their Sundays with others and for being so welcoming.

It's time for the Annual Meeting

March/April in the Church of England is the time for the Annual Meeting.

The Annual Parochial Church Meeting may not be the most exciting event, but it's an important one. People rarely turn up in big numbers for the meeting - in fact, probably vicars worry when people do turn up in big numbers. But important things are done at the APCM.

It is when the churchwardens are elected for the year. They are the Bishop's agents in the parish and represent all parishioners. That's why everyone who lives in the parish is entitled to vote, and not just those who are members of the church.

The accounts are presented at the APCM. You can discover how much it costs to run the parish (you'll probably be surprised how much) and where the money comes from. The Vicar will give a report, saying what has gone on in the past 12 months, and what the plans are for the future. His report should give you a good idea of what the life of the parish is like.

Reports will also probably be given on the condition of the buildings, so you can learn whether the church is about to fall around your ears next time you attend.

Then there are elections for those standing for the Parochial Church Council, which is the body, along with the Vicar, which organises church life in the parish.

If you want to learn what our church does, what it's ministry is all about, and what the various church officers do, come to our APCM. You'll probably be surprised to learn how much goes on. A special feature will be a presentation of our hopes for the development of the Church Hall. Interested?

The husband and wife duo bring an infectious mix of heavenly vocals, lush harmonies and driving rhythmic guitars. Comprising Debs Hanna (vocals, whistle, piano accordion) and Stu Hanna (guitar, mandola, banjo) Megson have gained fame on the British Folk scene, not only for their arresting and intelligent songwriting, but for their exquisite musicianship and northern humour.

Open Door North East

This is one of the charities supported from our church Mission Giving last December. This Middlesbrough charity was birthed out of Jubilee Church Teesside in 2003 out of a desire to help what the bible calls the "stranger" or "Sojourner" in the land, those refugees and asylum seekers who find themselves living on Teesside.

Can you imagine arriving in a foreign country having fled war, persecution and torture, with no friends or family to turn to, and fearing for your life if you had to return to your homeland?

Our Archbishop, himself a refugee from Uganda in 1974, visited Open Door in December during his Pilgrimage of Prayer. The clients couldn't believe that 'the number 2 in the Church of England'

had come to see them - as you can see everybody enjoyed meeting him! John Dickinson and I visited them in January to find out more about their work.

Asylum seekers become destitute for a number of reasons, but primarily as a result of the withdrawal of Home Office support. Even when a person is refused asylum the Home Office often doesn't deport them, so they are left destitute and aren't allowed to work, so rely on charity to meet their basic needs.



CEO Paul Catterall (pictured in the centre next to Archbishop Sentamu) said, "When we first met Kamila, an asylum seeker from Pakistan, she was a frightened, vulnerable lady, who had become destitute when her Home Office support ended. In order to support herself she was working in a takeaway shop 7 days a week in exchange for a small amount of food and permission to sleep in the shop storeroom each night.

"We were able to get Kamila out of that exploitative situation, give her a room in one of our shared houses, provide her with a weekly food parcel and give her emotional support and advice. Following our help Kamila was able to re- engage in the asylum system, and was finally granted refugee status. Kamila said this to us

Maria found herself homeless after the Home Office stopped her support. She went to Open Door for help and they were able to place her with a host family. Maria was initially nervous about going to a stranger's home but almost immediately felt a sense of relief and peace. This is what she told their project worker. "I was made so welcome and had forgotten what it was like to be in a family setting. I feel so blessed, I feel a real person again, I



have grown in confidence and am now gathering the evidence I need to make a fresh claim".

The charity provides a wide range of services including a Women's Drop-in Food Parcels / Friendship / Arts & Crafts / Mother and Toddler Group (Little Stars) / Internet Access / Advice, Information and Guidance; Refugee Advice Welfare benefits / Housing advice. They recognise that learning English is one of the most helpful ways for people to integrate and build a life for themselves in the UK so provide ESOL Classes (English for Speakers of Other Languages).

They have a large team of volunteers helping in their work, if you'd like to explore joining them please call 01642 213 634. John Catterall would live to hear from you!





"Be on Time or Else.....!

When the Rev. Donald Pateman died aged 83, his obituary described him as "perhaps the most politically incorrect clergyman in the Church of England." He had devoted his ministry to the East End of London and wanted the law changed so that those found guilty of mugging, football hooliganism or robbery with violence could be flogged.



"Choristers were not exempt from corporal punishment if they stepped out of line," the obit continued," and this was administered by the vicar, who claimed parents thanked him for taking their errant sons in hand.

"The punishment for brides arriving late for weddings was different. In 1992 he introduced a sliding scale, details of which were handed to couples at wedding rehearsals.

"Ten minutes late meant the cutting of one of the hymns, 20 minutes the loss of two hymns, 25 minutes the dropping of all hymns and dismissal of the choir, and 30 minutes late would cause the wedding to be cancelled."

Twenty years earlier, when postmen were on strike, he announced that any seeking marriage in his church would be given a "work to rule" ceremony — no choir, no bells, no heating, no lighting, no music, no photographs, no confetti. He added: "Postmen earn the same money as me. spent three years at university and am expected to live on £21 a week. Why can't they?"



An Incredible Feet

The funeral took place in February of Keith Heaviside, an Aytonian born and bred. Keith had achieved what I think is quite an incredible achievement, but being a quiet and unassuming man, never wanted any attention in life. Perhaps in Spire we may rectify this now.

When Keith retired from ICI in his late fifties, he set himself a target to climb Roseberry Topping right to the top every day of the week, except Saturday.

By 8.50am each morning he would be stood on the corner of his road waiting for any more of his friends who made up the Last of the Summer Wine group



to join him. Hail, rain or shine, Keith climbed the topping, proving the old adage that there's no such thing as bad weather, just inappropriate clothing!

Keith celebrated his 80th Birthday on top of Roseberry Topping with Whiskey and sandwiches. He managed an incredible 6,100 climbs up Roseberry Topping before ill health stopped him from doing so in latter months. His friends worked out that over the years he walked 24,400 miles and made a total climb of 5,490,000 feet.

When he achieved his 6,000 climb, his friends sent an article into the D & S all about it with strict instructions not to contact Keith. Unfortunately they phoned to ask for a photograph and Keith wouldn't let them run the story. I hope this small article makes up in acknowledging an incredible feet that I don't suspect many others have done.
