An Idea for Lent

If you come to Church, you could even try it in worship too! Say a thank you for the bits you enjoy and find helpful. Your attentiveness will most probably help you come away even more enriched, and your words to others may encourage them too. The world will be a better place because of it.

LOTTERY FUNDED

ACTS 435

As part of our mission giving the PCC have supported Archbishop Sentamu's charity **Acts 435**, which takes its name from a verse in the Bible in the book of Acts. In chapter 4, verse 35 we are told that people brought money and "laid it at the apostles feet and it was distributed to anyone who had need"



The charity connects those who want to help with those who are in need via its website. Local churches have a

trained advocate who meets the person in need. The advocate verifies the need and posts the request on the Acts 435 website. Donors give online to meet the need of requests posted. The money is then given to the church to pass on to the person in need via the advocate - thus the church becomes the spokesperson for those in need, taking practical steps to help those facing practical difficulties. Holy Trinity church, North Ormesby is a local contact point to refer families in need of financial support.

The charity also has "Giving Packages" for individuals or churches to make donations which can be allocated to a variety of requests. Our money may therefore be used to 'Support a Family' – money for children's clothes, shoes; food or a cooker to enable healthy cooking; bed, cot, baby accessories.

It could be used to bring someone out of debt or to 'Change a Life' –helping to secure a job, with clothes and travel costs for an interview or help to get off the streets with a rent deposit, a bike to help get about or a bus pass.

ORGAN WORKSHOPS

We held our first Organ Workshop on Thursday 16 February, and Professor David Baker from Halifax Organ Academy came for the day to lead sessions with local schools in a fund and interactive way, supported throughout the day by Vicki and Martin.





If we are to attract new players of this King of Instruments, you have to plant the seed of interest early, so the day started with two workshops with Marwood Schools Years I and 2 children, where the workings of the organ were explained in a hands on way, and the children got to blow through pipes to make a sound.

In the afternoon we welcomed students from Stokesley Secondary Academy who are doing music as a choice. Part of their course is to write a composition for the organ, so Prof Baker explained the possibilities from the organ, whilst being displayed on the large screen so they could see what he was doing.

A skill of organists is to extemporise on a tune, so the
