Finding it Hard to be Good?

I came across this story in *The Messenger*, the magazine of Brookfield and Stainton Churches.

"Several years ago a preacher from out of state accepted a call to a church in Houston, Texas. Some weeks after he arrived he had an occasion to take the bus from his home



to the downtown area. When he sat down he discovered that the driver had accidentally given him a quarter too much change. As he considered what to do he thought to himself "You'd better give the quarter back – it would be wrong to keep it". Then he though "Oh, forget it, it's only a quarter. Who would worry about this little amount? Anyway the bus company gets too much they will never miss it. Accept it as a 'gift from God' and keep quiet".

When his stop came he paused momentarily at the door and then he handed the quarter to the driver and said "Here, you gave me too much change. The driver smilingly said "Aren't you the new preacher in town"?. "Yes" he replied. "Well I have been thinking a lot lately about going back to church. I just wanted to see what you would do if I gave you too much change. I'll see you at church on Sunday". When the preacher stepped off the bus he literally grabbed the nearest lamppost and said "Oh God, I almost sold your Son for a quarter".

Our lives are the only Bible some people will ever read. This is a really scary example of how much people watch us as Christians and will put us to the test! Always be on guard – and remember you carry the name of Christ on your shoulders when you call yourself Christian."

When we accept Jesus into our lives, he wants the full deal – not just the Sunday bits, but the whole of our relationships with our family, friends, neighbours, workmates and the like. If we let him down in just one part of our lives, then the rest comes toppling down like a deck of cards.

The truth is, being good all the time isn't easy. That is why we have each other to encourage and support us. That is why we have the best example before us in Jesus. That is why we need the help of God's Holy Spirit, for not everyone in life is loveable, not every situation is easy, and often we can be weak and fail to do the right thing.

Stand then, in his great might, with all his strength endued, and take to arm you for the fight the panoply of God. Paul

NEWTON NEWS

Bequest Saint Oswald's Church has received a most generous bequest from the late Mary Baines. As a young girl, Mary had worked in service at Newton Hall and always had a close love and connection with the village. Although a member of Great Ayton Methodist Church, Mary continued to attend special services like Harvest, until she was too frail to do so.

We are most grateful to Mary for thinking of the Church in this way, and the PCC are now moving to ensure necessary maintenance and pointing are carried out on the Church, as well as noting other works that could improve the worship experience.

Thanks to Mary's generosity, and knowing that for the time being the fabric of the Church will be cared for, the PCC have been able to be generous with donations given to the Diocese, principally from Church Fees from weddings in Church.

Freewill Offer At the last PCC Meeting, we unanimously decided to send $\pounds 15,000$ to the Diocese to help Parishes not in as fortunate a financial position as ourselves. The PCC also agreed unanimously that we should increase the amount we give to the Diocese next year from $\pounds 15,000$ p.a. to $\pounds 18,600$ p.a. A delightful old lady I used to take Holy Communion to in Whinney Banks when I was Vicar there in the 80's used to say, *"Vicar, Money is made round to go round. If you give it away, it comes back to you."* The generosity we show to God in life always brings a blessing back in return.

Rejuvenation Project for the Church Hall

Following on from our unsuccessful bid to the National Lottery to do a major revamp of the Church Hall, we are now having to look to more modest changes that can make significant differences to the facilities, particularly in the kitchen and toilet areas. (If you have ever attended a winter function are strayed into the gents loo, it's like visiting Narnia - always winter and never Christmas!)

SPA architects are drawing up a modernization program for us that will be put out to tender to local builders by September. By October we should have a better idea of the sort of sums we are looking at it to undertake the work. The plan is to undertake the work in the summer holidays of 2018 when the halls are least used.

How will we pay for the refurbishment? Once we have a better idea of the costs we will apply for grants from other grant making bodies who may be willing to help us. The likelihood is that there will be a shortfall that we will have to fill ourselves through Fundraising efforts starting in the New Year.



PROJECT SUMMARY

I) The Coffee Lounge toilets will be rebuilt from scratch over much the same floor plan as present but extended to take in the current table store and intervening external gap. This will provide Ladies, Gents, Accessible and baby changing facilities for both the Coffee Lounge and the Hall.

2) The Gents toilet in the Hall will be converted into a store room, principally to house Marwood School's gym equipment and any large items currently stored in the Coffee Lounge passageways

3) The Ladies toilet in the Hall will be divided in two. One half will be converted into two unisex toilets and a hand basin, generally, but not exclusively, for use by children when in the Hall. The other side will become a store cupboard for the tables currently stored next to the kitchen

4) The kitchen will be completely modernised, only keeping the central heating boiler and the instant hot water boiler. The size of the kitchen will be reduced by about a third. This will enable a walk in store room to be built at the far end with it own entrance at the base of the stairs leading up to the upper room. This store will primarily be there to house the cleaning equipment currently in the little room next the the



disabled toilet. The new kitchen should include an electric oven, electric hob, microwave, fridge and glass/cup washer.

5) The stage will be widened and segregated from the passage, linking the new kitchen with the Hall. The stairs to and from the stage will remain in the same place. It is intended that the new passage will be just that, and not house all manner of things as it does right now.

6) The sliding doors between the hall and the coffee lounge will be replaced The serving hatch shutter will be renewed if something with improved sound proofing can be found.

In addition to the main items listed above there will also be changes to the walls, floor finishes and lighting. Further modernisation around furniture, soft furnishings and projection equipment are all on the wish list but funding will decide how far down that list we get. The important part is to get the toilets and kitchen modernised first.

The coffee lounge kitchen will continue to be modernised this coming summer using the talents of Phil Rotherham. It is hoped that a glass washer will be installed as part of this modernisation work.

Finally any suggestions for improvements that may have been missed or other points you may wish to raise would always be very gratefully received.
