Time for a Reformation?

Five hundred years ago on 31st October 1517, a devout German Roman Catholic Monk called Martin Luther made a protest against the way his Church was going. Corrupt practices had come into the Roman Catholic Church and they were selling forgiveness for money in



order to raise funds to rebuild Saint Peter's Basilica in Rome. Luther strongly disagreed with this practice, and believed forgiveness couldn't be bought by money or good deeds, but always came through the grace and generosity of God.



As there was no Facebook or Twitter to get a discussion going, Martin Luther did what they did at the time to get people talking, he wrote out his concerns on paper and nailed them to the Church door in the German town of Wittenburg.


His was not a lone concern, for this acted as a spark to light a fire that engulfed Europe as more people joined him and protested – earning themselves the name Protestant. Many wished to move to a more Biblical view of the Church, and soon things were changing. The Roman Catholic Church, realizing that it did need to reform, then started the Counter Reformation, changing itself from within.

Today's Church is very different to what it would have been without Martin Luther and the Reformation. Like many institutions the Church had grown complacent and corrupt and needed reform. It needed to have the freedom to examine itself and reform. This was not an easy process and it was accompanied by violence and wars, but left unchecked things would have been decidedly worse.

Somali born writer Ayaan Hirsi Ali maintains in her book *Heretic*: Why *Islam Needs a Reformation Now*, that Islam is now at the same point in its history that the Christian Faith was with Martin Luther. It needs to free itself from the negative medieval



beliefs and move to the positive teachings that come from the Meccan period of Mohammad's life, when his teaching was more peaceful and loving. Once he had moved to Medina and become a Warlord, his language and actions were very different with more violence and intolerance.



Hirsi Ali argues that without reform, Islam is incompatible with Western values. British Law has equality written through it like a stick of Redcar rock, but Islamic Society is very unequal and this applies to non-Muslims, Muslim Women, and Gays. Simply look to the plight of non-Muslims in Muslim majority countries today. Christians risk becoming extinct in the Middle East – the cradle of Christianity. If we allow Sharia Law to trump British Law, then we do no favours to Muslims or others fleeing injustice in other countries.

Like Martin Luther, Hirsi Ali has a set of theses, of changes needed in Islam to bring about a peaceful reformation and allow Islam to retain a peaceful place within society. Today any challenge to anything Islam says is either met with violence or accusations of hate crimes that have more in common with Orwell's vision of 1984. As Hirsi Ali says *In no other modern religion is dissent still a crime, punishable by death.*

The majority of Muslims living in the United Kingdom will be appalled at the excesses of Islamic State, but history has told us that majorities can be irrelevant. The majority of Germans were not Nazis, yet Hitler came to power. The majority of Russians were not communists, yet Stalin's purges claimed more victims than WW2. The majority of Trade Unionists in this country in the 70's were not firebrands, yet we had strike after strike. All that is necessary for evil to triumph is that good men do nothing.


If we believe that the Christian Faith in Europe benefited from the Reformation and regained its vision and purity, then surely we should be doing what we can to assist those, like Ayaan Hirsi Ali, who wish to do the same for Islam and help it takes its place in the modern world.



pyramids, pulling all those stones across the desert and putting them one on top of another to create something wonderful.

If those on the end of the ropes all pull together, great things happen, but if there are not enough there to pull, or some don't pull their weight, then the remainder get exhausted and drop. We are a team and need each other to do wonderful things.

This year so far - and we are only nine months in - we have lost nine members of Christ Church through death, and others who have either moved away or who are ill. These were folk who were faithful in their attendance, involved in different ways, and generous in what they gave to us. The ropes they willingly pulled for all our sakes to help build our Church and make it something good for us to enjoy as we worship God are now slack and we need to make sure that enough people come forward to take up that slack to keep up the good work they have done.

A good Church, like a good marriage, doesn't just happen automatically. It needs work, commitment and sacrifice, and for our Churches to remain healthy we need people willing to be involved in their life and do things that need doing, otherwise they simply wont get done and we will all be the losers.



A Guide to Christ Church Great Ayton

Welcome to Christ Church, the composition Parish Church of Great Ayton. interior'.

The church is a Victorian Building constructed at a cost of \pounds 5,000 after the nearby 12th century church of All Saints had become too small to meet the needs of the Parish.

The new church was opened on 19 May 1876, and consecrated on 12 March 1877 by the Archbishop of York. William Thompson, following which a Confirmation Service took place. A number of prominent local landowners contributed to the cost of the church and the then Vicar, the Revd Joseph Ibbetson collected himself £1,400.

The architect for the new church was Mr John Ross, an old scholar of the Friends School in the village (now turned into flats). A newspaper account of the consecration suggested the church was `unquestionably one of the prettiest of its kind'. Pevsner, however, in his famous survey of the architecture of England's buildings, was less kind, Christ describing Church. rather harshly, having à restless as

the memory of Dr William Augustus Loy, his wife and daughter. Dr Loy died in 1886; he and his father, also a doctor, each served in the village in turn and had their surgery at 67 High Street. The memorial windows depict the Resurrection of Christ, His appearance to Mary, Christ in His healing ministry and 'a virtuous woman", as described in the Book of Proverbs, industriously employed for her family, whose children "rise up and call her blessed". Along the the south wall are several more coloured windows. One, overlooking the side chapel, was presented by the Kitching family in memory of Alfred Harold Kitching (brother of Mrs Pru Southall, formerly of Ayton Firs and now living in the village), a glider pilot, who was killed during the invasion of Sicily in 1943, aged 23. It also commemorates the other Aytonians who fell in World War II and includes not only their names but two well-known local features – Roseberry Topping and Easby Hill, with the Captain Cook monument. Above them are portrayed St George and St Michael, triumphant over the evil serpent. This window is the work of the artist Hugh Easton, who was also commissioned for a similar task in Westminster Abbey.



Further along the wall are the windows in memory of Dr Charles Stuart (who spent 39 years working locally) and his sister. These show the Nativity and the adoration of the shepherds in the stable at Bethlehem. The coloured windows nearest the church door, depicting unusually, groups of workers from various trades and professions through the ages, were presented in 1980 in memory of Dora JE Kitching by her husband and family.



The side chapel itself was created as a memorial to those local men who died in the 1914-18 was and their names are painted on either side of the triptych over the altar.



Perhaps the most striking window in the church is the richly coloured rose window high up in the west end of the church, which was dedicated by the Bishop of Whitby, the Right Revd Robert Ladds on 23rd April, Easter Day 2000, to mark the Millennium. The window was designed by Josie Kyme and made by Kymes Stained Glass of Middlesbrough.



The window was designed along traditional lines, in keeping with the gothic style of the tracery lights, which are arranged like spokes giving a wheellike effect. Within the rose, the small central circle contains the equilateral triangle representing the Trinity. Radiating out from that point, the blue and red glass takes the diamond shapes from the plain quarry leaded glazing below. The main colours of the window are blue and red, which, when lit by the evening sun, irradiate equally and are complemented by other colours which are arranged to appear more mosaic-like. The colour blue symbolises heaven and heavenly love while red is the church's colour for the martyred saints. In each of the radiating "lights" are roundels or circles of etched, painted, stained or fused glass containing symbolic references - the cross, the dove, wheat, IHS (the first three letters of lesus in Greek), the

grape and the fish. The small painted circles (three lower lights) in the band containing the inscription, are all early Christian symbols based on ancient forms of the cross and circle.

The Greek Mnemonic for Jesus - IHS, is also featured in the Victorian stenciling on the chancel ceiling that was painstaking restored in 2009.



Don't miss the magnificent stained glass window on the north wall, opposite the main door and the newest. This was made by Barley Studios of York and paid for by donations in memory of the Revd. Ted Appleyard, Vicar of the parish from 1968 -78, and then in retirement here from 1975, serving as a Honorary Curate.

Ted's great passion to reach out with the Christian message, combined with his great love of children, were combined by the stained glass artist, Helen Whittaker, in a most moving and imaginative way, In a window full of life, colour and energy, we see the figure of Christ calling the fishermen, while at his feet are three children. Andrew resembles Ted during the time he was vicar here.



Hanging on the north wall, near the link door which leads through to the coffee lounge and hall, you will see a painting. of Madonna and Child by William Lee-Hankey (1869-1952) that is on loan to the church from the Kitching/Southall family. Incidentally, the coffee lounge, office, cloakrooms, storeroom and linking corridor were opened by Princess Margaret 6 July 1971.

The organ was installed in 1899 and has just undergone a major restoration in 2016 funded by the Heritage Lottery Fund. Also included in the bid were the drop down screen from the Chancel Arch and the Digital Projector and Organ camera, that has made organ recitals so much more enjoyable. The screen is well used at many other times too. Numerous wooden fittings in the church are by Robert Thompson, the famous "mouseman" of Kilburn.



Among other interesting features on the North wall is a memorial plaque to the Rev'd Joseph Ibbetson, who was Vicar for 50 years from 1827 and who was instrumental in having the vicarage built in 1846 and, later, Christ Church.



There is also a framed version of the Lord's Prayer, executed by Edwin Rayner Burnley, using a quill pen, in 1847, when he was just ten years old — a remarkable piece of work which was presented to the church by his granddaughter. At the back of the church is a list of parish priests of Great Ayton from the 14th century to the present time. The list is complete from 1577.

These are just some of the things to see as you visit our Church. We hope you enjoy your time, and invite you to say a prayer while you are here, and sign the Visitors' Book.
