A Christmas Gift

In December 1992 I had my last Christmas at my previous Parish, so come December 2017 it will be my 25th Christmas here, and those years have flown by.

I brought with me from Saint Martin's in Middlesbrough the idea of a Christmas Appeal where the collections from the Carol and Crib Service go to a nominated Charity. Christmas is all about a God who gave to us, and continues giving to us each and every day, so what

better way to celebrate the season than by giving to someone else who is very much in need.

Whilst this Parish had many more Carol Services than Saint Martin's, it would be true to say that the attendances and collections were nowhere near as good as they are today. We have a policy of making sure that different people are invited to read the lessons each year, and the response to our Christmas Appeals has been brilliant. Over the years we have sent thousands of pounds away across the world to places like Ghana, South Africa, Middle East, Romania and Stockton. The main principle is that this is a gift - not an exchange.

For the last few years we have supported the wonderful work Helen Jones has inspired and founded at Roseberry School in Darjeeling, and I asked the PCC if we could once again support this worthy cause for our Silver Jubilee Appeal.

There was a programme on TV a few weeks ago when Sue Perkins of Great British Bake Off (BBC Version) was at the river Ganges. She talked to a group of really bright lads on the polluted river, who despite their intelligence had never been taught to read and write. Education is the key to a new life for them, and indeed for the children at Roseberry School in Darjeeling. With an education and learning the English language, the door of opportunity swings wide open, and this effects not just the children but their families too.

We raised just £4638 at our Carol Services last year, with a further donation of £600 going straight to the Charity from someone who attended the service at Saint Oswald's. Can we beat this amount this year? I hope so, for to think that some child escapes poverty and has a chance in life is a brilliant Christmas present. Please read Helen's article later on in Spire, and come along to one of our services - and give generously.

The True Story of Rudolph

A man named Bob May, depressed and brokenhearted, stared out his drafty apartment window into the chilling December night.

His 4-year-old daughter Barbara sat on his lap quietly sobbing. Bob's wife, Evelyn, was dying of cancer. Little Barbara couldn't understand why her mommy could never come home. Barbara looked up into her dad's eyes and asked, "Why isn't Mommy just like everybody else's Mummy?" Bob's jaw tightened and his eyes welled with tears. Her question brought waves of grief, but also of anger. It had been the story of Bob's life. Life always had to be different for Bob.



Small when he was a kid, Bob was often bullied by other boys. He was too little at the time to compete in sports. He was often called names he'd rather not remember. From childhood, Bob was different and never seemed to fit in. Bob did complete college, married his loving wife and was grateful to get his job as a copywriter at Montgomery

Ward during the Great Depression in the USA. Then he was blessed with his little girl. But it was all short-lived. Evelyn's bout with cancer stripped them of all their savings and now Bob and his daughter were forced to live in a two-room apartment in the Chicago slums. Evelyn died just days before Christmas in 1938.

Bob struggled to give hope to his child, for whom he couldn't even afford to buy a Christmas gift. But if he couldn't buy a gift, he was determined to make one a storybook! Bob had created an animal character in his own mind and told the animal's story to little Barbara to give her comfort and hope. Again and again Bob told the story, embellishing it more with each telling. Who was the character? What was the story all about? The story Bob May created was his own



autobiography in fable form. The character he created was a misfit outcast like he was. The name of the character? A little reindeer named Rudolph, with a big shiny nose. Bob finished the book just in time to give it to his little girl on Christmas Day. But the story doesn't end there.

The general manager of Montgomery Ward caught wind of the little storybook and offered Bob May a nominal fee to purchase the rights to print the book. Wards went on to print, Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer and distribute it to children visiting Santa Claus in their stores. By 1946 Wards had printed and distributed more than six million copies of



Rudolph. That same year, a major publisher wanted to purchase the rights from Wards to print an updated version of the book. In an unprecedented gesture of kindness, the CEO of Wards returned all rights back to Bob May. The book became a best seller. Many toy and marketing deals followed and Bob May, now remarried with a growing family, became wealthy from the story he

created to comfort his grieving daughter. But the story doesn't end there either.

Bob's brother-in-law, Johnny Marks, made a song adaptation to Rudolph. Though the song was turned down by such popular vocalists as Bing Crosby and Dinah Shore, it was recorded by the singing cowboy, Gene Autry. "Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer" was released in 1949 and became a phenomenal success, selling more records than any other Christmas song, with the exception of "White Christmas."

The gift of love that Bob May created for his daughter so long ago kept on returning back to bless him again and again. And Bob May learned the lesson, just like his dear friend Rudolph, that being different isn't so bad. In fact, being different can be a blessing.

Roseberry School Darjeeling

Last time I wrote a piece for Spire I was full of the wonderful things I had seen at Roseberry School during my April visit to Darjeeling. Everything was going so well, and our I0th anniversary was a great opportunity to show off what the school has achieved. Imagine my feelings when 6 weeks after returning to the UK I heard that ongoing political unrest had boiled over throughout the region and activists had demanded an all out strike of indefinite duration. For a few days I got terrible news from my friends there. Cars and buildings were being set on fire, extra police and even military had been drafted in to contain the situation. Shops, banks, schools, hotels and all other businesses had been closed down. The leaders of the strike were making impossible demands, but ordinary people felt obliged to go along with them. Then the internet was blocked and I heard nothing more from the town until the strike ended after 104 long days. It was a very worrying time.

Last week I received letters written by the children about their lives during the strike. They described their hunger and their parents desperate search for food. The children had been afraid to leave the house for much of the time. One of our senior teachers offered tutoring in her own home to a few of the pupils but for many it was too far to venture.



At the beginning of October, school was able to re-open, and now there is a big push to catch up. Secondary School entrance tests still have to be sat in spite of work missed or forgotten. The best news came a few days later, when we learnt that work on the new building could start in late autumn. We have high hopes that it will be ready for the new pre-school group in the spring, and have sent money for furniture and equipment. The last 2 years with no indoor base for the little ones have been so difficult. With building work finally complete the school should be well set up to begin the next 10 years. During that time we shall see the first of our ex pupils leave Secondary School as young adults, ready to take their place in the world.

Here is a man who was born in an obscure village, the child of a peasant woman. He grew up in another village. He worked in a carpenter shop until He was thirty. Then for three years He was an itinerant preacher.

He never traveled two hundred miles from the place He was born. He never did one of the things that usually accompany greatness. He had no credentials but Himself...

While still a young man, the tide of popular opinion turned against him. His friends ran away. One of them denied Him. He was turned over to His enemies. He went through the mockery of a trial. He was nailed upon a cross between two thieves. While He was dying His executioners gambled for the only piece of property He had on earth – His coat. When He was dead, He was laid in a borrowed grave through the pity of a friend.

Nineteen long centuries have come and gone, and today He is a centrepiece of the human race and leader of the column of progress.

I am far within the mark when I say that all the armies that ever marched, all the navies that were ever built; all the parliaments that ever sat and all the kings that ever reigned, put together, have not affected the life of man upon this earth as powerfully as has that one solitary life.







Not all people in Romania are poor, but generally speaking it has far greater poverty than we can imagine here. The Romanian CEO of Children in Distress said on a visit earlier this year, that most of these children would just receive this one gift at Christmas, so their parents and communities are very grateful. Each year they manage to find yet another small village that may have not received them before, so thank you to all who participated.

This year we collected 375 boxes at the service with a further 190 at Saint Francis Ingleby Barwick. Our thanks to all who support this valuable venture, and to Peter and Sylvia Robinson, once again being Santa's little helpers at the depot at Prestons of Potto.

PCC JOTTINGS

We have just held the November Meeting of the Great Ayton PCC. So what sort of things occupied our time?

We heard that progress has been made on finding a replacement organist when Michael steps down at Christmas. Watch this space for more details and a photo.

Geoff gave very positive feedback on Bishop John's visit to help us find the real Jesus, and Enid spoke of a most positive experience at the Archdeaconry Day. How do we show that Jesus is Lord in our own lives and the life of our Church?

Ken gave an update on our Financial situation which shows a projected deficit of around £3,000 by the end of the year. We have lost many generous givers and are looking as to how to encourage the next generation. We still have a lot to be thankful for.

The PCC had £10,000 budgeted to give away, on top of collections and appeals. The following causes were each nominated for £1,000 each: Christians Against Poverty - which help poor people find strategies out of debt and how to deal with credit companies and courts; Bible Reading Fellowship - which in addition to Bible Study Notes is engaged in young people's work and founded things like Who Let The Dad's Out nationally: **UCCF** - the organisation behind the Christian Unions in all our Universities and colleges: ACTS435 the Archbishop of York's Charity that seeks to help poor people in our area; TOGETHER MIDDLESBROUGH - Helping the Churches in Middlesbrough run foodbanks, holiday clubs and many other things in our area: BRAMBLES FARM -The Church is seeking to reach out into this area, and so we have sent £500 each to the Coffee Cart run by the Vicar of Brambles Farm and also to BIG KIDZ a youth charity working in the Middlesbrough Parishes: both the Church Mission Society and the United Society Partners in the Gospel (USPG) who support the world Church overseas got £1000 each. We gave £750 pounds each to the Children's Society and Mission Aviation Fellowship and £500 to the **Stokesley School Youthworker Project.**

Minor repairs to All Saints Church were agreed, as was work on upgrading the Church Hall toilets, kitchen and storage. The estimate of around £110,000 will have to be found by grants and maybe a Gift Day too, as it was recognised how many people value and use the Hall.

Arrangements have been made for Christmas worship, but we still need someone to organise the mulled wine & mince pies after the Carol Service on 17th December - so much easier now the mulled wine comes ready made in bottles. Any offers?
