# **DATA PROTECTION & SPIRE ONLINE**

New regulations are coming into force in May that may mean that we have to ask you specifically if you wish to continue to receive Spire. Online This has usually been either verbal at the time of booking things like weddings or Christenings, or via an email sent with an initial copy. We now will need to record permission, which will be easy for new subscribers, but a little harder for the 700 + who already receive Spire via pdf. I am looking to see if there is a better way of doing this than 700 people sending me an email all at once!! In the meantime, if you receive Spire electronically and really don't want to, please let me know straightaway and I will remove you from the list, as I also remove any addresses that are returned undelivered.

This year has been a very demanding one, but also a very enjoyable and rewarding one. I went into this situation firmly believing that the Parish had had a rough time not of their own making, and needed to be put back on an even keel. What better for them than slipping on that old pair of slippers from next door. I haven't done anything revolutionary in my time there - just tried to love them and show them that God loves them too - and I have received much love in return.

We have also reached out into the community with a welcome that has seen folks flocking back for Christenings and weddings, and hopefully the new Vicar can use some of that to help rebuild the younger end of the Church.

Given the extra demands in time and energy, you can't do everything, and I am aware that there are things left undone that I ought to have done - both in Nunthorpe and back home at Great Ayton and Newton - but I have tried to keep as many plates spinning as possible, so my apologies if it is yours wobbling or fallen.

My experience at Nunthorpe has reinforced the belief in me that we need first and foremost to be a welcoming congregation if we want our Churches to grow, and we have to meet people where they are, for many don't understand where we are coming from. We have many traditions which we treasure, and newcomers may come to value them too over time, but maybe not understand them straightaway - so we need to be flexible, loving and patient.


Most importantly we also need to be there, present in worship, in order that we may be an encouragement to others. This month sees the Presentation of Jesus in the Temple, sometimes called Candlemas. An old couple, Simeon and Anna were there and said such wonderful words of encouragement to Mary and Joseph about their son that they were remembered, repeated and written down. How many people come, and then don't come again in our Churches, because we weren't there to be a Simeon or Anna for them, and welcome and encourage them? Last year saw us lose many faithful members of Christ Church who did reach out to others, so lets make sure we pick up where they left off continuing to make our Churches places of welcome and worship.





Our sincere thanks to those who put in that extra effort.





In between Aladdin in the Church Hall, we also saw Marwood School take advantage of the stage and lights for their production of an excellent nativity play. The children did so well performing to two packed Halls, and then the Reception Class took the play on tour around the village, calling in at Little Fishes and the Methodist Church.

Carol Services started in abundance with those at St Oswald's, Christ Church and All Saints. I did services for the WI and Nunthorpe Scouts, and Christ Church was bursting at the seams for the joint schools carol service for Roseberry and Marwood schools.



We get such a great selection of Carol Services in Great Ayton, and this year celebrated the 50th Anniversary of Carols on the Green. This annual event is organised by the Parish Council, and Tim Hall brings together a band each year to play. There were several who have been present each year!





Christmas Eve was also a Sunday this year, so we had almost too many services, but the one that was definitely the most popular was the Crib Service where the Sunday School performed the Christmas story for us. Midnight Mass has lost the Sentamu effect from two years ago and continues to slowly decline. The time was when people saw attending this as an

integral part of their Christmas. Today they are more likely to attend the Crib Service.

A special open afternoon allowed customers and nosy editors to have a good look around the bright and spacious premises, upstairs and down.




They must be congratulated on the wonderful transformation inside, whilst keeping the character outside.




#### Watermill Music
