Life is a Gift

As Easter approaches, so we remember the events leading up to Jesus' arrest and crucifixion at the young age of 33. If I had to take a funeral in the village for someone as young as this whose life had suddenly ended in a violent way, I would find the whole event traumatic and emotionally

draining, yet we are so familiar with the Easter story, that we can take it for granted, and not appreciate how the disciples felt when Jesus, their friend and teacher, was ripped away from them.

Life is fragile, and each and every time we switch on the TV we are reminded of it. You don't have to live in war torn Syria, just attend school in America and you can be at the mercy of powerful weapons just the same. (I'm not convinced by President Trump's idea to arm teachers. Can you imagine being in a stroppy class and the teacher cracking? Where will it stop?) You can also be minding your business driving along the road when someone else ploughs into you, or walking through one of our cities or towns and be on the end of an unprovoked and indiscriminate attack. Or, possibly even more likely, the doctor calls you in with a serious face when your recent test results have come back.

Jesus reassures his disciples in the upper room after sharing the Passover and what we call the Last Supper with them, that ultimately all will be alright, and they will all meet again in heaven. They have his assurance that he will prepare the way for them to follow him. That promise is for us today as well, but we don't just want Pie in the Sky when we die, we want Steak on the Plate while we wait. We want to enjoy this life and each other whilst we can.

Jesus said, I have come that they may have life, and have it to the full. John 10:10 How do we start enjoying and appreciating that fullness of life now? Perhaps the answer is to take each day as a sacred gift and not take it for granted. Live it to the full, and use it to show love to those around you in case it is your last. Be generous in what you do, and in what you say, and don't hold onto any grudges or bitterness. Life is too precious and important for that.

We have the chance now to go around spreading love and blessings to those around us, to help make life better and more enjoyable for others, and as a consequence, for ourselves too. Let us use the opportunities whilst we can, for whether tomorrow comes or not, we will know we have made a difference for the good.

Enjoy the rest of Lent, and may the blessings of Easter be yours.

CHURCH HALL UPGRADE

Christ Church Hall must rank as one of the versatile and best used buildings in our village. We go there for parties, plays and pantos, functions and fund raisers, to keep fit and to eat charity lunches, to celebrate births at christening teas and remember loved ones at funeral teas, for wedding receptions and anniversary parties, to play badminton and toddler rugby, for school PE or After School Clubs, for Moo Music to Dancing, from Rainbows to Senior Guides, to hear Big Band to Live Bands, as groups to talk or older people for a warm and comfortable service, or maybe even to give blood. (Fingers crossed that we may get them back!)

Our Hall is really well used by our community, but some of the facilities are decidedly lacking, as you will know too well if you have been brave enough to venture into the main hall toilets, or have seen the main kitchen desperate for a refit. These are areas urgently in need of a major upgrade, but this sort or work cannot be funded by rents alone, which hardly cover the day to day maintenance.

We carried out a feasibility study last year as to what we could do from a complete rebuild, a major renovation, and just the desperately needed work. A complete rebuild was out as costs were far too high, so we hoped for a major upgrade with Office and an extra Meeting Room & entrance added downstairs at a cost of £500,000. Unfortunately the Lottery Fund turned us down, so we are now trying to do the really essential work.

- New extended and improved toilet block at the rear of coffee lounge
- Open up the passageway by moving storage in the former gents toilet in the Hall and sealing off the side of the stage.
- New fully equipped kitchen in the main hall
- New chairs for the hall



We have received a quote to do this work for £100,000, but the good news is Robin Harmar, Chairman of the Hall Committee, has already secured us a grant of £40,000 from the Impetus Environmental Trust, and we have our fingers and toes crossed that we may also secure another grant from the Leader Fund. The Discovery Centre has just received a large grant from the same body, so we are not taking it for granted.

So, on Saturday 21st April we are having a GIFT DAY and will be inviting the village to support us in this. The more successful we are, the better facilities we will all enjoy. It's a chance for all of us to be generous and hand on to future generations a place where we want to meet to celebrate.

It's our hope that if we can make a decent upgrade, then we may also be an attractive venue for more reasonably priced wedding receptions - especially over the summer months.

Please pray that people may respond generously, and when your envelope drops through your letterbox, please be generous in what you put in it.



We would like to see our Church Hall be a good enough venue to host wedding receptions for couples needing a cheaper option. At the moment the toilet and kitchen facilities let us down.

It's not just weddings, but ALL Hall users deserve better facilities for their functions - but we need help.



35 turned out on a cold February morning to give Fr Kevin a warm welcome back to Great Ayton.



He shared something of his life's journey, admitting to losing his faith as a teenager, but rediscovering it and becoming a parish priest. However, it was only on entering Ampleforth that he experienced the profound sense of finally coming home. On the quest to find our true selves, he encouraged us to devote 20 minutes each morning to contemplative prayer – sitting in silence, emptying our minds and allowing God in. Slowly our attitudes change and others may notice. Like the green log on the fire, which initially hisses and crackles, but in the heat of the flames eventually quietens until it starts to glow and radiate heat itself. Fr Kevin recommended that we (and especially our young folk) take time out from social media to reconnect with nature to relieve stress and reduce depression. After contemplative prayer we broke for coffee, before looking at two bible readings and a poem on the same theme. Father Kevin is inspiring. Time flew and we left feeling revitalised and at peace.

POPPIES FOR REMEMBRANCE

A Group of around 20 folk met in the Discovery Centre to see if Great Ayton was up to doing something special to mark the 100th Anniversary of the end of World War One as the Armstice was signed at the 11th hour of the 11th Day of the 11th Month of 1918. At 11am on 11th November this year we will be gathered at the village War Memorial to remember the fallen from our village of both World Wars and all who have died in the service of their country - but will be especially remembering the 48 young men from our village and community who died between 1914 and 1918.



There was great enthusiasm that we do a display similar to the one seen at Nunthorpe and the knitters are already busy. Overleaf you will find a pattern if you wish to join then knitting poppies in poppy red wool. Copies of pattens (as there are more than one) are available from the Discovery Centre and Christ Church, and finished poppies can be left at the

Discovery Centre with Pam Dutton, or left in Christ Church.

What ideas did we have?

First and foremost we need something by the War Memorial. We already have 48 ceramic poppies, but would like to make a feature in front of Christ Church and on the bank side along Guisborough Road.

A suggestion was that we could copy the Royal British Legion's idea from last year, when stanzas from John McCrae's famous poem, *In Flanders Fields* could be written in poppies outside Church, by the wicker soldier on High Green, and on the grass outside Langbaurgh Close. (Assuming necessary permissions granted) thus bringing the village together.

What do we still need?

- More people knitting either on their own or in groups. It would be good to have school and community involvement.
- People willing to fix poppies onto sticks
- Funding for sticks, wool or other expenses. Any donations, please send C/o Great Ayton PCC. Any surplus will be forwarded to the Royal British Legion.
- Someone with artistic flair to help plan and folk willing to help arrange.

KNITTED POPPIES

For the best finish, knit with a Double Knit (DK yarn]. The size of needle you choose will determine how big the poppy will be, but we recommend 3,5mm or 3.75mm (UK9). If you have different yarn left in your stash, just use that and the appropriate needle size. If you have any problems with any of the techniques in the poppy patterns, and you have access to the internet, you will find lots of tutorial videos on youtube.

I. Easy garter/knit stitch pattern for beginners

Colour A Red (one ball will make a lot of poppies!)
Colour B Scrap of Black or a black button

Body of Poppy

Using Col A cast on 120 stitches.

Rows I-4 Knit

Row 5 Knit 3 stiches together across the row(40 stiches)

Rows 6-9Knit

Row 10 Knit 2 stitches together across the row(20 stitches)

Rows 11-14 Knit

Row 15 Knit 2 stitches together across the row(10 stitches)

Cut yarn leaving a tail of about 20cm

Thread tail through yarn needle and slip all the remaining live stitches onto the yarn tail and pull tight Pull around into a circle and then mattress stitch (or use whatever stitching you normally use) to seam for an invisible seam. Sew in ends.

Centre of Poppy

Using B, cast on 16 sts. Cast off. Coil into a tight spiral and sew base to the centre. Or use a black or green button with 4 holes and sew to centre of poppy. Add pin.

2. Easy ribbed poppy pattern

Colour A1 ball red yarn (this will make a lot of poppies) Colour B Scrap of black yarn or black button

Body of Poppy

Using Col A Cast on 60 stitches

Row s1 -10: K2, P2 across whole row(for a slightly smaller poppy do 8 rows of rib).

Row 11: Knit 2 stitches together across the row (30 stitches).

Row 12: Slip I stitch, Knit 2 stitches together then pass the slip stitch over... repeat across the whole row (10 stitches).

Break off yarn with long tail and thread back through remaining stitches and pull tight Join edges with mattress stitch

Centre of Poppy

Using B, cast on 16 sts. Cast off. Coil into a tight spiral and sew base to the centre. Or use a black or green button with 4 holes and sew to centre of poppy.

A Giving Church

Giving is a sign of love, and here at Christ Church we see it as part of our calling to try and be as generous as we can.

Many years ago the Church Council agreed that all collections taken at Baptisms, Weddings and Funerals could go to support other charities. Yes, we lose out on the money that may have come to us otherwise, but our generosity in supporting other causes means that far more is given for some very worthy causes. The table of figure shows the recipients last year.

In addition to these collections are our special appeals which usually happen at Easter, Harvest and Christmas, with sometimes extra ones added if tragedies have happened in the world at other times.

Christ Church Council then decide each November where our budgeted giving will go to, and last year we dispersed £10,000 to many Mission Organisations local, National and world-wide. The table overleaf doesn't feature the £5,169 of Charitable Giving from Saint Oswald's PCC at Newton under Roseberry

We also send a "Freewill Offer" of money to the Diocese, and last year this was £88,200, together with £8,165 raised in Fees from weddings and funerals taken in Christ Church. From St Oswald's Newton we sent £30,000 to the Diocese and £3,057 in Fees primarily from weddings taken. Thus the total these Parishes sent to the Diocese last year was £128,422, and the Total to other Charities was £40,112.

We give this as our response to God, who has given us so much. We are in the top 5% of the world population wealth wise, and in Parishes that have been truly blessed. Our generosity ensures that in a poorer part of the Diocese another Church still has a Vicar.

Why am I not surprised at this generosity? Because we belong a very generous community where there are many groups or individuals raising funds for Cancer Research, RNLI, Children's Society, NSPCC etc, and give lots of time and energy too. The other Churches are also generous in what they give away, and we see great support across the community for the Middlesbrough Foodbank with regular collections in the village. An old lady in my previous Parish used to say Money is made round to go round. If you give it away, it comes back to you. How very true. Thank you to a very generous community.



Parking Along Guisborough Road

The Parish Council have contacted me, as they in turn have been approached by residents about congestion along Guisborough Road when services are on, and have asked me to make a plea for sensible parking along the road keeping just to one side, so that traffic can flow.

I am happy to do that, but it is not simply the Church attenders causing the issue, as I have been around long enough to remember when the only neighbours' vehicle parked on Guisborough Road opposite the Church was a van belonging the Water Board. Back then an even bigger congregation parked on the Church side of Guisborough Road without any problem, as the neighbours presumably parked their cars in their garages at the rear.

Households are now likely to have more than one car, so Guisborough Road can now be full of cars parked opposite the Church that belong to the neighbours. We allow many neighbours to use the Church Car Park through the week to help clear the road, on the understanding that on Sundays and for any services that the car park is cleared. If they just move their cars back onto Guisborough Road, you can see there will be a problem with people coming to Church.

This year I had to leaflet cars in the Church car park as one Sunday morning there were 7 cars filling the car park before the congregation arrived, and I hadn't a clue who many belonged to as some just appear without a word being said. They don't always belong neighbours on Guisborough Road. We also have people attending functions on Saturday evenings in the Hall and leaving their cars as they have had a drink and can't drive them home, forgetting that



7.30am on a weekday morning

the Church Car Park on Sundays is for worshippers at Church. So the traffic issue is not just down to Church attenders.

A few weeks ago on taking my dogs out at 6am I noticed a car double parked on our side of the road outside the Church Hall. When I returned at I2.30pm after taking the service at Saint Oswald's, the car was still there, but it had nothing to do with Church - and maybe not even the neighbours either.

The problem is we have far too many cars these days, so please, if you are coming to Church - share cars with neighbours or friends, don't double park, and do as many do, and use Low Green or over the bridge. Neighbours and Function attenders, please support us by leaving the car park or Guisborough Road as free as you can, and together we may make a difference. Many thanks. **Paul**.




