# Living Christ's Story

In his Presidential Address to the online meeting of York Diocesan Synod on the 27th November, Archbishop Stephen set the scene for the major business of the morning, in which Archdeacon Sam Rushton would begin to map out a route towards the transformation emerging from the Deanery and Parish Consultations earlier this year:



"What we're sharing is not yet a highly crafted, totally thought-through plan. We are sharing where we've got to with the story so far. But we need your help. We are going to shape this together. As a Leadership Team, we think we have the broad outline of the plot so far – we know how the story starts and a pretty good idea of where it needs to end. We've begun to see who the key characters are and how they need to grow within the story.

"Now, with you, we need to work out the chapter headings and the pace of the narrative. Then we can begin to inhabit this evolving and changing story together, which is our story, and Christ's story in this place. Some of that we will do today. Some we will do in the New Year."

He spoke of five themes becoming clear from the process so far:

- We cannot carry on as we are.
- We need a compelling vision.
- We need to be a more generous Church.
- The Church is for the world.
- We need to see in the Diocese of York a huge growth in vocations to ministry in the church, both lay and ordained.

#### A MARK OF FAITH

I started a new project this year. You may have heard about something like it before for example the #weatherscarf. Each day of the year they knit a row. The colour represents the temperature and the type of stitch could represent the weather. When complete you have a scarf which represents the whole year.



I first heard about this in 2020 and liked the idea, but I can't knit! But this year someone suggested a new idea. Why not use another medium? And so #weathercrossstitch was born!

Each coloured block represents the max temperature (in  $3^{\circ}$  increments) and the backstitch colour represents the predominant weather I experienced on that date. The days snake up the cloth starting in the bottom left hand corner. Up to  $22^{nd}$  Feb in the photo.



I'm really enjoying this. It's fun and relaxing to do, about my peak of creativity, and appeals to my inner nerd. It's just a pretty graph really!

But you will note that the title above is A mark of faith. That's because starting this was a big thing for me. Without going into details, I wasn't looking forward to 2022. There didn't seem much to look forward to and quite a few things to worry about. But <u>starting</u> this project, which could well fail (there are an awful lot of days in a year!) represents hope that this year will be worth remembering. It is a real mark of faith and trust in God that hope for a better year is possible.

Many of us start a new year with trepidation. Which new crisis will we have to face? What new thing can go wrong this year? It is hard for us to face the future with hope and determination. But I have found this little project, which is so insignificant in the grand scheme of things, to have been really healing. Is there something which you can do which puts your mark in the sand? Your own little way of declaring to the world, or at least your little hidden corner of it, that you won't give up in despair but will put your trust in your heavenly Father, who loves

you very much. Or if you don't want to start something that lasts a year in March, how about doing something for Lent? And as you spend the time each day on your chosen activity you could pray for someone or something that has helped you today to face the future with hope and confidence.

If you do decide to do something I'd love to hear about it and celebrate with you. And if you are interested in my progress I'm happy to share it each month – it will be a reason to keep going! To keep on with my little mark of faith which says that I will trust, I will hope, I will believe that the God who has brought me this far, will walk with me each day. Whatever the weather. Jane





## **Charitable Giving 2021**

"Money is made round to go round" said Mrs Hunter to the young vicar stood before her, "If you give it away it comes back to you." Mrs Hunter was an OAP living in Whinney Banks when I was the new Vicar. She lived in a council bungalow, didn't have a lot, but was so generous with what she did have. Every month when I took her her Home Communion she would give me her offering envelopes, and invariably also a  $\pm 10$  or often a  $\pm 20$  note for flowers in Church. One day I protested that this was too much, and then she gave me the above lecture firmly putting me in my place. She was far nearer God's kingdom than the Vicar!

Here at Christ Church we try and make our money go round to support others with our Charitable Giving. It comes in various way.

**PCC Giving** we decided as a PCC some years ago to give  $\pm 10,000$  pa to support Anglican/ Christian Mission Agencies & Ministries, for if we don't support them, who will. Each year the PCC Members champion a cause that usually gets  $\pm 1,000$ each.

**Special Appeals** We hold special appeals for Christian Aid Week, Harvest and Christmas, and often a Disaster Appeal as well, This is added to our giving.

Life Events Collections We donate all our collections from baptisms, weddings and funerals to charities - usually chosen by the family, although at baptisms we limit to Children's Healthcare Charities. We do not need to do this, and many Churches choose to keep the collections for themselves. Well, the Church does need money too. We have found that people give more when they identify with the cause so this approach brings more money in and lots of goodwill too. Sometimes families even choose us!

In addition to all this support there are the monthly Foodbank Collections and Love in a Box. We also support the Guides and the Scouts in a more hidden way by giving the Guides free use of the Church Hall every Friday to meet. If the parents had to pay the rent then Guiding would be a far more expensive activity. Likewise we host the Scout hut on our land and also the Scout van for the princely sum of  $\pounds I$  per annum as a special arrangement to support them.

All this giving is only possible because people are inspired to give to us. We know there is not a bottomless pit as times are harder. As Ken said last month, our Church income has fallen considerably due to the pandemic, and Robin would also confirm that Church Hall income is down too with far less bookings. Nevertheless we try and be as supportive as we can, as we appreciate the support we receive.


