The Hope of Easter

When I wrote my last editorial in February (I gave the Archbishop a chance in March) I would never have thought that we would be talking about a Third World War being possible anytime, and that threats of nuclear war would be bandied about without any thought for the long term



consequences for all. Do we ever learn from history? If not, then as they say we are condemned to repeat our mistakes.

The Japanese nation were so shocked by what the atom bombs did to their nation that they have turned completely away from them, not willing to contemplate such horror for anyone else. We also know that the effects of the accident at Chernobyl on 26 April 1986 are still having long term health consequences for people living in that area. Surely those living in close proximity must remember this, but they threaten nuclear war and shell nuclear power stations! Best to lick your finger first lads and check which way the wind is blowing as you don't want to be downwind. Trouble is that wind can be so unreliable, blowing where it wants.

The Second World War also saw millions of Russians and Ukrainians being killed by the Nazi war machine, and it wasn't just Jews. The Nazis had no concerns over killing millions of Slavic people as if they were of no account. 14 million Russians and 7 million Ukrainians were killed in WW2. How can they forget?

The Russian people endured the horrors of the siege on Leningrad as the German forces sought to starve the city to death, and yet here we are seeing civilians being deliberately targeted by Russian Troops and the city of Mariupol reduced to rubble with no food, water or electricity as the relief convoys are held outside the city in order to bring it down. Seeing Mariupol now on the news it is just rubble. Will this be true for Kyiv/Kiev as well? And we thought we were living in the 21st Century! Mahatma Gandhi was once asked what he thought of Western Civilisation and his reply what that he thought it would be a very good idea. He had it right.

There are already many victims from the War from both Ukraine and Russia with lives lost, homes destroyed and lives irrevocably changed. The Post Traumatic Stress from all of this will take generations to work through.

Casualties will of course go a lot further. We are getting ourselves concerned about the shortage of oil and gas, but there is an even more obvious area for hardship, and that is food. The agriculture of Ukraine provides food for 600 million people and the wheat from Russia and Ukraine is the bread basket of the world. If that harvest fails because it is too dangerous to plant it, then millions of other people

are going to face severe hardship. Egypt is one of the countries dependent on grain imports, and the income of the populace are already struggling to put food on the table. If world grain prices rise, then the poor will be squeezed first, and the likelihood of instability and suffering grows. What an absolute mess.

The one thing we can say today, is that (with the exception of nuclear weapons) the world has been here before. People have suffered great persecution and suffering and come through it.

Easter reminds us of the disciples seeing their friend and Master be crucified before their eyes. The years of the early Church were ones of great persecution, and whilst we read all the positive bits together in the Acts of the Apostles, the persecution and killing of Christians for their faith was very real. Only one of the 12 disciples died of old age. The other 11 met violent deaths of one description or another and this continued. It wasn't just the Christians for the Temple of Jerusalem was raised to the ground in a siege by the Romans that ended in August 70AD with the result of the Jewish people - and Jewish Christians - being dispersed throughout the world in yet another refugee crisis.

At Easter time the Jews remember the Passover and their deliverance from slavery in Egypt and their journey of deliverance to the Promised Land by Moses. At Passover they remember a history of tyrants throughout the ages culminating in the Holocaust in the Second World War.

Christians too look back to the early years of faith and the many persecutions, which increased their resolve and belief. Such persecutions are still common place today in different parts of the world. Humanity is sinful and gets so many things wrong. Perhaps the most important words from the Easter season come from the cross of Good Friday "Father, Forgive them for they know not what they do."

If the world is to rebuild when all this passes, then the only way will be through Forgiveness and Love, but it will be a very hard road as so much hurt has been done. Too hard for humans to contemplate alone, but Easter tells us that we are not alone, for Jesus is Alive and with us. He travels with us to give us strength to forgive and reach out to others and we have already seen great signs of this with the huge generosity to the millions of Ukrainian refugees.

Easter tells us that love has the final word. May that be true of the troubles in the world today, and may you and yours know that love at this challenging time.

Facebook. Cafe church re-started in September and meets in the church hall every 2nd and 4th Sunday at 4pm. Weekday services - Holy Communion on Wednesday at 10am, and coffee lounge Communion on the first Monday at 2pm, are also well attended. Prayer for the Day (8.45am via zoom and Facebook) continues to be a blessing to people, both from our own church and other churches near and far.

Finally, our LED lighting project to update and improve the church lighting, and reduce our carbon footprint is going ahead in February. Damp is affecting the southwest corner of the church and this is currently being assessed and resolved. Our new church architect, Alexa Stephens, recently visited to advise about heating /draught proofing and further reducing our carbon footprint. We are continuing with general maintenance and plan to paint the external doors this year.

We have checked that the church silver and other items of value are kept safely.

There is a large group of people working behind the scenes week by week to enable our church to function, and we are very grateful to everybody who helps. This group includes our Sidespeople, volunteer cleaners, flower arrangers, and the coffee team. Since covid, a number of people have been unable to continue in their role. Thank you very much to Pauline Titchmarsh, who organised the coffee team for many years, and thank you to Celia Elliott who has taken on this role. It has been lovely to start having coffee after the 9.15am service again. Thanks also go to Jan Thompson who has stepped down from organising the church cleaning, and thank you to Irene Reah and Lynne Nicholson who are taking over from her.

New people have joined these teams, serving God and our church community. We all have a role to play in the functioning of our church but fewer people are involved now than were before covid. Please consider carefully what you could contribute.

We thank God for His continued blessings, enabling us to fulfil His ministry here in Great Ayton.

Christ Church Annual Meeting

We are delighted to report that at Christ Church's Annual Meeting on Wednesday 16th March both Churchwardens were duly re-elected for a further year.

Amazingly the 4 PCC Vacancies were also filled with Andrew Prunty, Linda King, lain Wilson and Rodney Wildsmith, with Robin Harmar also standing again. Mary Mason has now taken over as Safeguarding Officer from David Fox.

Ken Taylor, our Treasurer, reported on a challenging year financially, but with much still accomplished. Due to a reduction in Income we have reduced our Freewill Offer to the Diocese by £3k to £91,440 and our PCC Mission Giving by £2k to £8,000 for the year, but will see how things go. The reduction of the FWO was mitigated in a change in Fees where a proportion of the Fees for cremation services formerly came to Church and now 100% goes to the Diocese. This amounts to almost £1,000 pa in our Parish with the number of services taken.

The PCC will be reviewing what we do as a Church to see how we can make more mission opportunities in what we do.

Little Fishes

For those of you who don't know me, I'm Rosie Lovell, and I took over the running of Little Fishes in 2021, with lots of support from Lucie Swales, Jane Robson and Geoff and Angela Jaques. I want to take this opportunity to say a huge thank you to them and to Ali Prunty for pitching in with story telling.

We have been fortunate enough to welcome back a lot of volunteers to the tea and coffee rota who have been a huge help in the smooth running of the group. A massive thank you to them.

We started meeting face to face in September (Tuesdays 9.45am). We have a short service, with a story and



singing and dancing. We then move on to play with a craft linking to the story. For example, at Epiphany during story time we found all the things the Wise Men would need on their journey. We then had a craft to make crowns for the kings.

We have had the same lovely families joining us each week and have welcomed new faces too. It is amazing to see the children and parents/carers spending time together, learning about Christ in a fun, relaxed environment.

I have been sharing our adventures on a closed Facebook group, and have been advertising the group using social media to encourage new members. Our numbers have been healthy even with COVID, which is fantastic!

Marwood School Headteacher writes ...

We were delighted to be chosen by Christian Aid to participate in a national art project about Climate Justice and on Friday we welcomed artist Lydia Virgin who worked with our Year 2 children on a piece of collective artwork. We are awaiting the final image which we plan to display in our playground for all to see and reflect on. Photos of her visit with the children are on our website.

Today, we received a wonderful email from Lydia.

"What a privilege and pleasure to work with the year 2 children of Marwood Primary!

It was wonderful to engage in discussion about the challenging issues surrounding Climate Justice — and to hear from their astute sharing that they have a grasp of these issues beyond their years.

I heard about the pollution of oceans, about fuel consumption, rainforest de-



struction, littering, waste, industrial pollutants — and I watched as they grasped the concept that we are ALL connected — connected with the natural world around us, and with ALL humans — from our immediate families, to our local communities, to our country and out to all the humans around the globe. I saw such compassion within the children as we reminded each other that our actions always affect others — good and bad - that they ripple out beyond our immediate environment to the world at large; that the way we choose to live in this part of the world has a dramatic impact on others far across the globe who might be less equipped to cope with the changes we create.

The children showed their care for those less fortunate than us - and those the most impacted by the accelerated climate change caused by our luxurious lifestyles. They showed kindness, they showed love.

As their art work began to emerge — their feelings were expressed with clear and direct messages. Stop the waste and the overconsumption. Stop the destruction of nature. Stop the pollution of all the different kinds. Care for this planet and its' humans. To them it is simple. They have clarity and wisdom uncluttered by the complications of our adult minds.

We used a collection of reclaimed materials for the structure of the piece — a reclaimed table top which they decided was our planet, some laminated plastic for the background of our galaxy, and wood for the bunting which symbolised the celebration of life in all its forms. We decided we would not negatively impact this planet with this art piece. They

each drew themselves holding hands around the planet — like their school logo — to show their care for one another and that we are all connected.

Along with their direct messages urging us to stop the negative impact on our planet, came messages of love, of hope, of peace. We saw rainbows and hearts, trees and animals, people caring for each other and playing games — images and reminders of beauty.

One child wrote, 'Love your neighbour as yourself' – Climate Justice beautifully encapsulated and understood.

Our result is the combination of all the thoughts and creativity of the afternoon — collated in a piece which, I feel, expresses the passion and wisdom of the children — and communicates clearly that which they desire. Justice for all. Beauty for all. Peace for all. All life on this planet — in harmony. The children believe we can achieve this — that if enough people choose it — it will happen.

I stand with them – in prayer, trust and love."

There are a few tweaks to angles now that we have had chance to get used to them, and an additional light for the main altar as the two spots originally for it had been trained on the cross and the effect was too good to lose. The people involved in the work of Torch Trust are always eager to find new ways to share God's love with blind and partially sighted people. The Bible can provide an amazing source of comfort and encouragement in the struggles of life, but is not always accessible to everyone with sight loss. Braille takes quite a lot of learning and large print relies on a degree of sight remaining. OPERATION PATHWAY is a unique initiative now being launched by Torch Trust.

Pathway MegaVoice players, which will contain NIV New Testament and Psalms, read by David Suchet, along with an introduction and several songs by Marilyn Baker, are being offered as a gift to anyone who is losing their sight and lives in the UK. The player itself is small and easy to use – about the size of an Amazon Firestick or a packet of Polo Mints. It has large, easy to find buttons allowing play, pause, forwards, backwards and volume control. The batteries in the device are rechargeable and the charging cable is provided.
