Earthshot

Dear All

Twice in the last century the World was plunged into two huge struggles for survival as World Wars engulfed the world from 1914 - 1918 and 1939 - 1945. On the latter occasion it was very much a cosmic struggle of good against evil as the Nazi regime planned the



extermination of a whole race of people - the Jews. On Remembrance Sunday this year we will hopefully once again gather in number outside Christ Church to remember the fallen and lay our wreaths and then move into Church as we commit ourselves once again to work for peace.

This is far from being an empty gesture for once again the world is fighting for its very survival. This time we fighting the very possibility of extinction as the earth has finally said to us enough is enough. The exploitation of the earth's rare resources have done considerable damage, coupled with the thoughtless casting aside of waste that has polluted the world and the gradual warming of the planet that is causing more extremes of weather. Experts reckon we have but 10 years left to reverse the damage, otherwise it will be too late, and a terrible legacy to pass on to future generations.

Faced with this very real situation we can do one of two things.

Firstly, we can see that the problem is so big that nothing we can do can make a difference, so just resign ourselves to a very dark future. The run on the shops with Lockdowns and shortages for Christmas warn us that the veneer of civilisation is very thin, and when the chips are down many people will just look after themselves.

Secondly we can do something positive about it to affect change - however small that may initially be, for like the snowball, things grow when they get momentum and others start joining in.

Did you manage to watch the *Earthshot Prizes* hosted by Prince William on TV the other week. If you didn't, then catch it on iPlayer

Back at the beginning of the 1960's President Kennedy set a challenge that by the end of the decade they would have a Moonshot and put a man on

the moon. It seemed an impossible ask at the time, but come 21st July 1969 Neil Armstrong walked on the moon delivering his famous speech "One small step for man, but a giant leap for mankind."

Facing the huge issues affecting the planet, it would be easy to give up. Instead Prince William has started his Earthshot Prizes to encourage people to make a difference where they can. Over the next ten years there will be a winner in each of these categories who will be awarded $\pounds I$ million to further their work. It's hoped that innovation and passion will grow.

- Protect and Restore Nature
- Clean our Air
- Revive our Oceans
- Build a Waste-Free World
- Fix our Climate

In the excellent book that accompanies this project there are many examples of positive things happening and damage being redressed. We still have some time left and damage can be reversed. We owe it to all who come after us to try our best in this regard as we have made a huge mess of the world.

Earthshort: How to Save our Planet is only £10 online.

For the Christian this is not an optional extra, but part of our calling responding to a Creator God who saw all that He had made - and indeed it was good - and then gave us charge of this wonderful creation to use, but not to abuse.

We need to make our responses, both individually and as a Church, and elsewhere in Spire you will read of a move in this direction with our Church lighting. (Note: St Oswald's moved to LED lighting back in 2012 and All Saints has always been green!)

Misson Giving

In his book, *The Water Babies*, Charles Kingsley had a wonderful character called Mrs Do As You Would Be Done By. The the inference of the name is "Treat people as you would like to be treated, and expect to receive the same treatment back."

As Kingsley was also a Church of England Clergyman as well as a Social Reformer, it's highly likely that he got his inspiration for the character from the Gospels, especially words of Jesus like *Give, and it will be given to you.* A good measure, pressed down, shaken together and running over, will be poured into your lap. For with the measure you use, it will be measured to you.' Luke 6: 38.

It is with the hope that if we as a Church prove faithful and generous to God in what we give to support both the Diocese and many Christian Charities, that God will bless our generosity by encouraging people - maybe even those reading this article - to be generous back to our Church.

In November the Church Council decide who the recipients of our PCC Giving will be for the year. We aim for at least 10% of our Income to go to Charities on top of our Freewill Offer and various Appeals throughout the year.

The basis of our decisions of which causes to support are

- Christian Charities and especially Anglican ones, for if we don't support them then who will? We avoid purely secular charities as anyone can support them.
- That they further the Gospel by Word or Deed.
- That we try and get a spread of Local, National and International.

Our Income has taken a huge hit with COVID, but we still hope to give $\pounds 10,000$ away, as the charities we support have taken bigger hits to their income than we have.

Patterns of Worship for November

Our patterns of worship changed considerably during Lockdowns and the later time of 9.30am. We have already reverted to 9.15am to give time for Sunday school and arrival at St Oswald's and it was wonderful to see Sunday School restart on Harvest Sunday.

My intention was to bring the Choir back to 9.15am on the 2nd, 3rd, 4th & 5th Sunday with the return of Parish Communion and to keep the 5pm Evening Communion Service as quite a few of the 8 o'clockers have enjoyed this. Unfortunately the best laid plans In November I am having to move Love in a Box to 4.30pm as we inadvertently scheduled it right in the middle of the Marwood disco in the Hall. In December the Freemasons have asked for their Christmas Carol Service again, so I am having to move the evening BCP back to 8am again. This means in November we will be back to 8am and 9.15am every Sunday, but will retain a non Eucharistic Service on the Ist Sunday of the month for the time being.

We are still a work in progress, but hope the majority of our Christmas Services will be okay.

New Lights for Christ Church

The needs of Church buildings are constantly changing for today our expectations of levels of heat and light differ greatly from a generation ago. Also the use of Church buildings for a whole variety of other uses has also grown with the years. The availability of LED lighting now provides efficient and effective lighting at a reasonable installation price.



Christ Church has had several lighting schemes over the years, each new one an improvement on the last. The plaque in Church detailing a scheme gifted by Worthy Pearson in 1927 was most probably hanging lights from the hooks still visible between the pillars.

The present scheme installed in 1991 used reflected lights from the ceiling giving a softer, diffused light. It relied on 10×200 watt Tungsten Halogen floods on each aisle and a similar number in the Chancel - that's over 30 in

total - and we went down to 200 watts! The nave had 5 large floods with gas filaments.

Running this scheme was very expensive as we are constantly replacing the bulbs. Age has meant the ceiling isn't as reflective as it was, and the needs for good and flexible lighting have risen considerably.



Moves towards Nett Zero have also meant that getting replacements for the bulbs is getting harder all the time as old halogen bulbs are being phased out.

The PCC asked two firms to submit schemes and costs based on an LED system that would give flexibility of use, so we can be bright when needed or have a more intimate light for other occasions. Also the plinth area needed to be lit separately for Concerts, Choirs and other usage. Sunday use is to

The two quotes that came in were very different, so we have gone with lan Robinson of Knaresborough, whose quote of $\pounds 12,180$ plus VAT came in half of the other one. A group of us visited several Churches where lan had installed the lights and we were most impressed.

Short tracks will be fixed to the walls that allow lights on three different circuits, thus giving various lighting options. We chose to avoid dimmers as they can give problems.

For installation all the pews will have to me moved, so it is likely that Church will be out of use for a week. We have the Bishop's permission to move Sunday Services into the Church Hall. Any small funerals could use Saint Oswald's and we will avoid any weddings or Christenings. This work is likely to happen after Christmas as we need Faculty permission first.

We are applying for grant support for some of the cost, but don't know

whether this will be successful or not, so if anyone wishes to support us with any donations, that would be greatly appreciated.

On the 3rd Sunday of every month we make a collection of goods and monetary donations for Middlesbrough Foodbank. This was started by Gordon & Dorothy Wood many years ago and is now continued by Helen Land.



First thing on the Monday morning following Helen arrives at Church to load up. Thankfully she has a large car and as you can see, its full to the brim - no room for passengers. This is then taken to the main Foodbank Depot in Middlesbrough.

Usually following on from all the Church Harvest Festivals their shelves are full of food ready for the demands of winter, but as you can see from the photos, whilst they have quite a bit of stock, the shelves are far from full.



Whether this is due to lower Church attendances due to Covid - hence smaller amounts, or may be folk already getting anxious themselves about winter? Perhaps it is even going out as quick as it comes in? I suspect all three reasons may have had their effect, so just to say that YOUR support is greatly appreciated.

Introducing "Friends of All Saints"



All Saints church played a major part in the life and development of Great Ayton as a village for almost seven hundred years, surviving the reformation and other social upheavals, until it ceased to be the parish church in 1876. It remains a pre-emininent heritage site, the only Grade 1 listed building in the area and part of the James Cook Trail. If you have a family

connection to All Saints, are interested in old churches or simply like the idea of helping to keep this important place open to the public and fit for continuing use by all the community as a living church, then we are seeking your support.

Like so many voluntary organisations and charities our finances have been acutely affected by the pandemic restrictions. Until the reopening in June 2021 our income had been non- existent for eighteen months whilst we are still faced with an annual insurance bill of \pm 700. Next year we must also find a similar amount to pay for the compulsory five yearly building inspection, and maintenance work can crop up at any time.

We can open All Saints to visitors from all over the world because our volunteer guides give their time freely. The "Friends" scheme will enable others who wish to support us to do so financially, aiming to produce a more stable and viable income for the long term.

To become a "Friend of All Saints" you just need to make a donation as small or large as you like. This could mean a monthly/annual standing order or a one off amount. You could also leave a legacy in your Will. As a "Friend of All Saints" it is planned that you will receive regular newsletters, updating you with developments and forthcoming events.

What's wrong with the World?

A teacher in Uganda is good at her job. But it doesn't pay well, so to make ends meet she is also a pig farmer, renting some land and breeding piglets to sell at the local market. But when lockdown hit, she had no furlough payments, feed prices trebled, and she nearly had to sell her pigs. Fortunately she managed to borrow some money until things eased and is still hanging on.

She now needs to keep pigs rather than growing crops because of climate change. Until recently, rain came at the same time each year, and crops grew reliably in the rich fertile soil, enough to feed her family and have some to sell. But now the rain comes early or late, too little or too much, or not at all.

It doesn't seem fair to me that skilled professionals doing useful work are not paid enough. It doesn't seem fair that a virus should bankrupt people because a government was already in too much debt before the pandemic began. It doesn't seem fair that, because of my air miles, petrol consumption, and taste for meat, others should go worried and hungry. We are commanded to love our neighbour, and that, rather than scientific or economic arguments, is why we need to restrict climate change.

Tearfund have produced a series of short videos by Katherine Hayhoe, a climate change scientist and Christian, and I would recommend them to you. To watch the videos, Google "Tearfund Climate Change" or simply click HERE..

Of course, global warming and saving the planet are not the only problems we as Christians are concerned about. In the End, God will renew his damaged world, and save His people from the consequences of our past mistakes. Our priority is honour His Son who entered the world to save us through his death and resurrection.

But saving the planet and saving souls are not competing concerns, any more than preaching good news was at odds with healing the sick, feeding the hungry, or calming the storm. Our mission is material as well as spiritual, egaging action as well as our faith. If a sparrow does not fall th the ground without God knowing about it (Matt 10:29), then crop failure, wildfire, floods, and hurricane destruction - with all their consequences for animals and people - is his concern as well. And we are God's hands and voice in the world today.

We need to discover more about what is happening, feel compassion for those for whom it is not fair, pray about what we can do to change, and be prepared to back this up with money, time and action. It is a simple way for us to love our neighbour.
