The ARCHBISHOP OF YORK, Stephen Cotterill, kindly came to Christ Church on Good Friday to lead our meditations on the Cross and at the close shook hands with our congregation.

Welcome to Summer **RED** is the colour of WHITSUN

JUNE 8TH is WHITSUNDAY, also called PENTECOST from the Greek for 50, as it comes fifty days (if counting inclusively) after Easter Sunday.

The colour RED symbolizes joy and the fire of the Holy Spirit. Ministers wear red vestments on Whitsunday and many in the congregation wear red as well. Whitsunday in Italian, "Pasqua Rossa," means "Red Easter."

According to the Acts of the Apostles "...suddenly there came from heaven a sound like a mighty rushing wind, and it filled the entire house where the disciples were sitting. And divided tongues as of fire appeared to them and rested on each one of them. And they were all filled with the Holy Spirit."

Shortly afterwards Peter, inspired, addressed the people nearby and 3,000 of them asked to be baptised; so Pentecost is often considered the Birthday of the Church.

Now, isn't that Quite Interesting?

ALL SAINTS CHURCH the oldest and only Grade 1 listed building in Great Ayton is now open to the public. Normal opening times are from Tuesday to Sunday between 1.00p.m. and 4.00p.m. until the end of October, depending on the availability of guides. But also note:

Saturday 12th July at 7pm: Concert by violinist Benjamin Baker "Exploration – inspired by the spirit of James Cook".

June 1st (and on the first Sundays of July, August and September) at 6pm: Gentle, contemplative Taizé-style worship for everyone, with sung and spoken prayer, silence, and time to reflect.

HEARTWARMING NEWS FROM ST.OSWALD'S

We read, in this year's Annual Report, from the Treasurer: "I look around and it's heartwarming to see so much generosity and selfless giving not only financially but also time and energy. St. Oswald's church may not be the biggest church, but it touches many lives through its giving. There are many charities that we donate to through weddings (although there have not been as many weddings as in previous years), baptisms, church services (eg. Harvest). St. Oswald's always gives large amounts to local charities at Christmas. The church also gives generously to York Diocese throughout the financial year."



And the Wardens write of their First Prize: "On Bluebell Sunday we planted two Buddleias in the church yard. These will help to attract butterflies and other pollinators to our award winning church yard. We also instigated a new mowing regime. This will allow for greater biodiversity by allowing wildflowers to grow rather than being cut down. Because of our churchyard management we won first prize for churchyard of the year, and we also achieved our Silver Eco Church Award. Congratulations to John Stinson and all who help in looking after this beautiful space. Hopefully we will achieve gold status soon."



Two spotted flycatchers were spotted using the church grounds to catch small insects. These birds are on the R.S.P.B. red list as their numbers have declined 88% since the 1970s in the U.K.

St. Oswald's Eco Church News

John Stinson writes: "The Spring weather has resulted in warm sunny days with well above average temperatures across the whole country. Spring flowers and tree blossom have seen the emergence of insects in larger numbers than is normal for this time of year. We have also seen the arrival of house martins, sand martins and swallows. In the next couple of weeks swifts will return and hopefully take up residence in the recently installed swift boxes in the village. At St. Oswald's we are hoping that the spotted flycatchers will return and take up residence in the letter bird box within the church grounds.

Our Eco planning at St. Oswald's for this year includes a visit from the children of Marwood Infant School to the church grounds in June, to carry out a "Mini Beast" survey, as well as studying the flowers and grasses. The pupils and staff will explore the grounds following a pre visit activity session within the school, with a follow up session later. The 32 pupils and staff will hopefully have a rewarding day and be able to develop their findings back in the classroom.

Church grounds are great places to explore nature because of their quiet location and are often referred to as "God's Golden Acre." We are looking forward to further develop our range of activities with other groups and organisations, as we expand our Eco Church programme."


Taizé style worship is inclusive and contemplative. It incorporates silence, sung and spoken prayer, readings from the Bible and time to reflect.

Lizzi Fox is organising a sponsored walk for pupils at Stokesley School at the beginning of September and several of our youngsters from **Cafe Church** will be participating. How about sponsoring them – or even having a walk yourself? Lizzi has sent us these further details:

Step by Step: Stokesley School Students Walk for Clean Water

As part of our mission to serve others both near and far, we'd like to share a wonderful initiative taking place in our local community – and invite you to be a part of it, especially as some of our youth members are taking part.

Stokesley School, in partnership with Stokesley Rotary Club, is raising money for the charity Village Water (<u>www.villagewater.org</u>), working in rural parts of Mozambique and Zambia, helping schools gain access to something we often take for granted: clean water, safe toilets, and hygiene education. For many children in these communities, the lack of clean water and proper sanitation affects not just their health, but also their ability to attend school regularly. That's why Stokesley School is supporting Village Water's "Sanitation for Schools" project, which aims to bring lasting change to schools in need.

To help raise funds and awareness, the school community has set itself a challenge: to collectively travel 7,000 miles – the distance between Stokesley and a school in the Mumbwa district of Zambia. Every student from Years 7 to 10 has pledged to cover a distance of their choice – between 10 and 100 miles (and some even more!) – through a range of physical activities. Whether it's walking, running, cycling, dancing, swimming, or even playing football, they're putting their energy to good use.
