#### Dear Everyone,

You are probably curious about who is coming to be your new vicar? As Rev Pev had such a long and fruitful time many of you won't remember having any other vicar. So here is a little about me; and in time I hope to catch up with as many of you as possible in person.

I was born and brought up in Darlington, leaving school at 16 to start work. ### Ken Taylor, our treasurer at Christ Church, invites us to reflect on "GIVING SUNDAY" Back in May Jon, Geoff and Nick treated us to mini-sermons on the subject of Christian Giving.

Jon reminded us of this parable from Luke 13 6-9: Jesus told the parable of the "barren fig tree". This particular fig tree has been fruitless for years and the man who owns the vineyard where it is planted has lost patience with it. "Cut it down," he says. "Why should it be wasting the soil!" But the Gardener pleads to give it another chance. "Sir," he says, "let it alone for one more year. If it bears fruit next year, well and good, but if not, you can cut it down."

The story of the barren fig tree contains both a message of reassurance and a warning. It's all about the vital necessity of "bearing fruit". There are of course, many ways to bear fruit for God, but we are kidding ourselves if we pretend that what we do with our money, our possessions, is not an essential part.

The promise, the reassurance in the parable, is that God gives us a second chance; the Gardener - Jesus - pleads on our behalf: the warning is that ultimately we shall be judged by the fruit we bear. Ultimately, we shall all stand before God and be required to account for how we have used the gifts He has given us. Will *we* have borne fruit? "

#### Nick added that in 2 Corinthians 9, Paul gives us a profound message about giving.

Giving is not just our opportunity to work in partnership with God to meet human need but is also for our own spiritual benefit. When we sow generously, we reap generously, not necessarily materially – this is not a prosperity theology where we give to build our own bank balance. But rather, the more we choose to give, then the more we become like our generous God.

God loves a cheerful giver because God is a cheerful giver. Paul says we are enriched in every way so that we can be generous on every occasion.

These, says Ken, were two of the key messages we received on Giving Sunday. Not only do we need to give to God, but we also need to give to sustain our church. Many of us have not increased our giving for many years - surely now is the time to address this with our new Vicar joining us very soon? Much of what we give goes to pay the Vicar's stipend - and this is very belatedly due to rise by 11.7% this year. Then there are our own church costs; energy, insurance, maintenance all have risen by inflation or more! So PLEASE consider what you give to the church NOW. I know that we are all affected by the rising cost of living but surely the church is a key part of that; if we all gave the church the extra cost of a cup of coffee per week, I'm sure we could do without that extra cup!!
