


41% of children in Middlesbrough live below the poverty line.In 2024 15,270 people received food: 10,380 adults and 4,890 children

OUR CHURCH IN OUR COMMUNITY: MIDDLESBROUGH FOODBANK

We asked Dorothy and Gordon Wood about how they were prompted to start.

Milk (UHT or powdered) Sugar (500g) Fruit Juice (carton) Soup Pasta sauces Sponge pudding (tinned) Tomatoes (tinned) Cereals Rice pudding (timed) Tea bags/instant coffee instant mash potato Rice/pasta Tinned meat/fish Tinned vegetables Tinned fruit Jam Biscuits or snack bar

Being Boro born and bred, they did something about it! With unanimous support from our PCC, early in 2013 the monthly collection began, and soon their heavy carload of donated shopping left Great Ayton every month for one of the distribution centres. Nowadays it's Helen Land who oversees our donations.

It is a sad fact that there are many families in our area who are really struggling and depend on the foodbanks to be able to get through particularly difficult times. The foodbanks are not feeding the same families all the time but are there to help people in crisis and are referred by doctors, health visitors, social workers, citizens advice bureau staff, and welfare officers amongst others. Donations are kept and sorted in local depots so a quick and appropriate response may be given.

Everyone knows that this should not be necessary in a modern affluent Britain but through delayed social security payments, unemployment, rising costs, ill health etc, some families do find themselves unable to afford basic necessities. The thought of young children and adults suffering as a consequence is unbearable.

Will YOU donate some of these? PLEASE?

More recently our donations have noticeably reduced; perhaps *we* are feeling the pinch too? Our contributions will help to overcome this need by a professional, carefully controlled, temporary provision of basic food for three days.

Or your gifts of money will help too.

OUR CHURCHES IN OUR COMMUNITY: THE DISCOVERY CENTRE

An anonymous contributor is keen for Spire to share another facet to our life in our parish.

Thirteen years ago North Yorkshire County Council announced they were planning to close a number of small libraries...and Great Ayton would be among the first to go! The announcement was made to a packed church hall chaired by our then Vicar, Paul Peverell. It was clear that the village was not going to accept this lightly and a committee was quicky formed to prepare an action plan to turn the library into a community-run facility. Two of our church members, John Dickinson and Ken Taylor, agreed to join the committee as trustees; a business plan was produced, funding support was obtained from the Parish

Council, and the newly named Discovery Centre was opened on

8th May 2012 by local author Philippa Gregory.

Much has happened in the ensuing years. We needed more space-so plans were drawn up to extend up to Stamps Coffee shop- and the project won a "Best Community Project" award with our own Dorothy Moffitt collecting the trophy! This allowed us to incorporate a Tourist Information Centre and expand the second hand bookshop to give us an important extra source of income. We even had Rishi Sunak open the expansion before he became famous! And more recently a major refurbishment of the Centre was carried out.





Many new activities have been created: Arts and Crafts displays and workshops, a Knit and Natter group, Book Reading clubs, Storytime for mothers and toddlers, a chess club. But none of this could have happened without our staff and volunteer helpers. Although we operated with a professional librarian for a while, we now have two wonderful part-time administrators, but much of the work in running the Discovery Centre is carried out by our volunteers. Many of them are also active members of local churches - Anglicans, Methodists, Roman Catholics and

Society of Friends are all represented. So it is great to see that our church members are active in the running of what has become a "real gem" - to quote a recent satisfied visitor!!

Councils, Committees, Commissions and Synods – who runs the Church of England?

For my sins, which are many and grievous, I sit on almost every level of Church of England Governance, so I have been asked to explain a little about how the leadership of the Church of England works.

The Church of England is often described as episcopally led but synodically governed. Which means that although much of the leadership comes from Bishops and Clergy, there is the opportunity for lay people to be involved in almost all the decision-making processes of the Church, whether in the Parish, the Diocese or the Church of England as a whole.

The foundation of a somewhat Byzantine governance structure is the **Parochial Church Council** (PCC). Elected by the Annual Parochial Church Meeting it is responsible for working with the Vicar to promote the mission of the Church (pastoral, evangelistic, social, ecumenical) within the parish. It is responsible for the parish's buildings and finances and is a charity in its own right (so PCC members are trustees). It elects members to the Deanery Synod.

Deanery Synod functions are less well defined. They co-ordinate the ministry of parishes across a wider area (in our case Stokesley Deanery) and allow the sharing of good practice. Somewhat unkindly, a Deanery Synod has been described as a group of people waiting to go home. But under its current leadership (including our own John Dickinson as Lay Dean) Stokesley Deanery has become more effective in building relationships and spreading good ideas. Deanery Synods can send motions to Diocesan Synod for debate and Stokesley Deanery recently sent a motion to improve safeguarding which was debated and passed by Diocesan Synod. Importantly the members of Deanery Synods are the electorate for both Diocesan Synod and General Synod.

Diocesan Synod oversees diocesan priorities and mission strategy for the whole of the York Diocese. It is made up of Bishops, Clergy and Lay people. It is responsible for approving the diocesan budget and considering how funding is raised from parishes. At our June meeting we discussed safeguarding, finance, audit, human sexuality (LLF), education and the diocesan strategy (Living Christ's Story).

General Synod (which met at York University last month) is the Church's national governing body. It passes legislation affecting the entire Church which then goes to parliament for approval. So, it was General Synod that approved the appointment of Women Bishops in 2014. It debates national and international issues; oversees the national budgets and considers changes in doctrine, liturgy and policy. In July we approved a financial framework for the next three years; improved clergy pension provision; set up a redress scheme for survivors of abuse within the Church; considered new liturgy around God as Creator; and made it easier for military Chaplains to work across different diocese.

Through General Synod one can be elected to a range of other committees and commissions. I have served both on the Crown Nomination Commission (which appoints Bishops) and the Church Commissioners (who oversee the Church's historic wealth) – but they are stories for another day!
