Last year's quinquennial inspection required a survey of our spire. Later sending up a drone revealed that a small amount of repointing was needed. So recently these steeplejacks have done a detailed inspection and carried out minor repairs.

We hear prayers in church, and we join in with some familiar ones, but do we really know how to pray once we've left? We probably send up hasty requests throughout the day, asking God to help us with everyday problems as they occur, or may, at times, utter a desperate plea for a loved-one who is suffering, but do we really have regular conversations with God that keep us focused on his presence?

Unless we are supremely self-controlled (and we, at least, are not) prayer can be something we don't always fit into our schedules. It can become haphazard and a bit repetitive. Would you like the 'Prayer for Dummies' solution? Choose a prayer partner! A prayer partner is someone you can talk to easily, someone you can trust with your innermost thoughts, and know they won't be repeated to others.

The two of us have been prayer partners for just a few months, and we can highly recommend it. We'd been attending Geoff Jaques' Wednesday afternoon discipleship sessions for some time, when he suggested to the group that we may like to start a new prayer group or choose a prayer partner. There are already one or two small groups which have been meeting for years, but we decided to become partners and now meet once a fortnight in one another's homes.

There are no rules about how to conduct these meetings, and you can please yourselves how you arrange them. We are still learning how to make best use of our meetings, but tea or coffee helps us to relax at the start, and we usually share our latest worries and concerns as well as our recent moments of joy. Saying these things out loud to one another seems to make sense of our sometimes jumbled thoughts, and highlights areas in need of prayer. Once we both have a sense of our emotional and spiritual wellbeing, we agree on the things we each want to focus on and offer our spoken prayers to God in what feels like a 3-way conversation. We often come across a prayer we like and read that too. This has led to further discussion sometimes.

We're only a phone call or a WhatsApp message away from each other whenever we need to ask for prayers for something specific, and this has been a huge comfort on several occasions.

Don't just take our word for it though. Mention it to God next time you're talking to him, and perhaps he can suggest a prayer partner for you too.

All Saints Church will be reopening to the public over the Easter weekend, commencing Friday 18th April. Normal opening times are from Tuesday to Sunday between 1.00p.m. and 4.00p.m. until the end of October, depending on the availability of guides.

2024 was a very good year for the church with visitor numbers over 1000 nearing pre-covid levels including significant numbers of overseas visitors and fundraising meaning that we can undertake some essential remedial work, including the restoration of the 18th century sundial. **A big thank you** to all who responded to the Gift Day Appeal. In **2025** look out for another classical concert in July as well as some of the usual events such as Taize services and the Summer Songs of Praise at the end of August.

There is always something new to find out about the oldest and only Grade 1 listed building in Great Ayton, so come down and talk to one of our friendly guides.
